HISTORICAL NOTES

In 1841 the total population of the Parish was 750 – 108 of these in Duncrievie, 122 in Damhead (as Glenfarg Village was called in those days) and the rest of the estate and farms. In 1950 the Population was 707. In 1841 however there were 2 schools in the parish - one , the parochial school near the Church and one in Duncrievie. They both had about sixty pupils. The first Sunday School in the parish was held in the Duncrievie School. It met in the evening.

Boys and Girls go off to start school for the first time. Its a milestone in their lives and their parents lives, and I'm sure this poem will strike a chord in every mother's heart,

I thought she was a big girl growing strong and tall Running in the garden, dashing down the hall.

Today alas, I've changed my mind, memories so full As I dress her in her uniform for her first day at school.

I try to stem my heartache and the tears that dim my eye For she looks so small and helpless as I wave a bright goodbye. But when I turn away from her my tears flow like the rain I see her lying in my arms a baby girl again.
