#### ARNGASK SCHOOL

Admission to Arngask School 1986-87

All children who will be 5 years of age by 28th February 1987 will qualify for admission to school in August 1986. Parents who have children who will be 5 years of age between 19th August 1986 and 28th February 1987 may delay the admission of these children until August 1987 if they so desire. Parents of children who are due to begin school in 1986 are requested to enrol their children in Arngask School not later than 31st January.
