

# THE COMMUNITY COUNCIL NEWS

A meeting of the Council was held on 4th March, 1986, when a large body of the public attended.

Mr Lindsay, Chairman, welcomed the Reg.Councillor, Sir Alan Smith, and the Dist.Councillor, Mrs Rosemary Ferrand. The minutes of the meeting held on 3rd December, 1987 were read by the Secretary, Mr Tarling, and approved. Among the many items discussed was the latest information regarding the suggested tennis court project. Mr Lorne Findlay informed the meeting that negotiations were in hand, but far from finalised, before they were, the whole matter would be discussed at a public meeting. Other matters dealt with, were, Highway re-instatement, Bus Deregulation, and the present position of the Ochil Hospital. The Treasurer, Mr Millar outlined the financial position, which put the funds in a healthy condition. It was proposed and passed that the Community Council, give a grant of £200 to the Hall repair fund. It was also decided to make up to £90, the fund for the school prize giving.

The Secretary announced that the retiring councillors this year, were Mr Lindsay, Mr Millar, and Mrs Little. Mr Lindsay and Mr Millar are willing to stand for re-election, but Mrs Little declined. The Chairman thanked her for her services during her term of office and wished her success in the future. Nomination papers were available at the meeting, or can be obtained from Mr Tarling. Should an election be found necessary, the date will be announced, after the A.G.M. which will be held on 30th March, 1987, when it is hoped that there will be a good turnout. Among the items to be discussed then, will be the suggestion that the affairs of the Village Hall and the running of it, should be transferred to the Community Council. Food for thought there.

# ARNGASK CHURCH NEWS

Home and Family relationships are of great importance – In the whole business of living. Here are special opportunities which we ought to be facing. # GUIDES


The absence of Guide news over the last few months has, I'm afraid, been due to forgetfulness on my part, and not to any lack of activity on the part of the Guides.


## DIDN'T THEY DO WELL!
