

RETIRAL OF Mr. & MRS. GEORGE ROSS

A social gathering was held in the Village Hall on Wednesday 1st July 1987, when many friends and present and former pupils attended to pay tribute to Mr. Ross, the village Dominie for the past 29 years at Arngask Primary School, and Mrs. Ross who taught also at the school, both retiring on 30th June 1987.

As a result of a public subscription, Mr. Ross was presented with a gold watch, coffee table and bookcase, among many other personal gifts made by friends. The presentation was made by Elizabeth Carswell, one of the first pupils in the class taken by Mr. Ross on assuming the position 29 years ago. She was assisted by Toni Geddes a pupil in the final class to be taken by the Dominie. The presentation to Mrs. Ross was made by Sheena Rodger and Colin Gourdie.

Welcoming the gathering, Mr. James Lindsay, Chairman of the Community Council, said although the occasion was tinged with sadness at the termination of such loyal and devoted service to the school and the village, the community were delighted that Mr. & Mrs. Ross were to stay in the village.

Mr. Robin Lambie in a glowing tribute, said that as well as being the village Dominie, Mr. Ross performed many voluntary duties in the village, far too numerous to mention, but specially mentioned was his service for so many years as Session Clerk. This was mentioned and appreciated also by the Rev. James Caldwell, a previous Minister of Arngask Church, in a speech to the gathering.

In a witty reply Mr. Ross thanked all who had in any way contributed to the honour being accorded to Mrs. Ross and himself, saying it had been a very happy period in his life being the Headmaster of the village school in which former pupils had gone on to greater things. This was mainly due to the dedication of parents, and to the excellent staff he had worked with for so many years.

Mrs. Sheila Harley, in a vote of thanks to those who had contributed towards the gifts and the retiral party, said that from her experience no doubt Mr. & Mrs. Ross would have so much to do in their retiral, they would wonder how they ever found the time to go to work.

As a complete surprise to Mr. Ross, three sturdy former male pupils presented him with the school desk he had occupied for many years, with the school bell he had rung so often, to stand on the desk.

Crime Prevention Bulletin

THIS MONTH'S THEME

CAR SECURITY

Stop and think before you leave your vehicle

Lock all doors, windows and the boot of your car. You may only be out of the car for a few minutes but that's all it takes for a thief to steal your property.

If you must leave expensive cameras, radios, leather jackets and the like behind, lock them in the boot of the car out of view. Leave nothing on show to tempt the thief.

If you see anyone acting suspiciously beside parked cars report it to the Police. He may tackle your car next.

Car windows are often left open to allow air to circulate for the benefit of the child or dog inside or even just to cool down the car. Children and animals must never be left alone inside cars. The temperature can rise within minutes and even with an open window can be a danger to health.

AROUND THE REGION

This is the time of year when people are travelling about and this includes the shoplifter. Shopkeepers and shop staff should be on the lookout for teams of such thieves who are busy in the region and should take advantage of the early warning systems. Thefts of property should be reported immediately along with descriptions of any suspects.

Building sites are also targets for thieves. When not in use portable tools such as drills and saws should be chained up or locked out of sight. Always mark your property whenever possible and retain a good description including serial numbers.

COMING SOON

* From 6 until 31 July, 1987, Tayside Crime Prevention Panels in conjunction with the Post Office will be promoting the use of post code and house number as a means of identifying personal property. Property can be marked by etching, die-stamping, branding, engraving, identification paint or by ultra violet security marker pen. During the campaign UV marker pens will be available, on loan, from police stations throughout the region. Please take advantage of this service but please remember to return the pens in order that others may also benefit.

* As this Newsletter is not published until after the expiration of the above dates, Kinross Police Station have retained some pens for a further few weeks, and these can be obtained on application at the Police Station.


