

COMMUNITY COUNCIL NEWS

On Monday 7th December 1937 a Community Council meeting was held in the Church Hall, with Mr. Lindsay in the Chair Secretary Mr. Tarling, and Councillors Imrie, Thompson, and Hume present.

Apologies for absence were received from Councillors Millar, Brough, Cheape and Ross. The meeting commenced with several members of the public present. Apology was also received from the Regional Councillor Sir Alan Smith, but District Councillor Mrs. Ferrand was present with advice and consultation.

Among village matters discussed was the latest development in the projected move to Wallace Park of the Tennis Club. Mr. Lorne Findlay, a committee member of the Club, explained that up to the present one of the plots of land in Hayfield Road had been sold, and it was hoped that the second would be sold in the near future. Anyone in the village with knowledge of anyone seeking a house site should contact him. Difficult times are ahead, especially in the matter of raising the required funds, but the enthusiastic committee will surely realise their aims.

Other items discussed were: (a) ownership of the old School playground behind the village hall; (b) condition of footpath (or lack of it) from the village out to Crawford Brae; (c) rights of ways; (d) speed signs in Main Road; (e) financial state of the Community Council.

All Community Council meetings are open to the public, and questions may be put from the floor, but items for the Agenda should be passed to the Secretary 7 days before the late of a meeting.

As detailed in Newsletter No. 52, Mr. & Mrs. Baird of 'Craigroyston' Main Road, Glenfarg, intend to restart the Youth Club, and the Community Council have granted them £50 to enable certain items of equipment to be purchased.

Date of next meeting: Monday 7th March 1983.

In handing over to Mr. Anderson, I can from personal experience say I have found in this community a great deal of

kindness and a willingness to follow an involved leader.

I wish your new Minister and all in the community many years of happiness, as together you work, learning from one another as you strive to establish the rule of Christ in this neighbourhood.







SCOUT REPORT


77th Perthshire Scout Troop.



We aren't looking for professional workers or fairy godmothers. What we need are MUMS and GRANS, (with around four hours to spare a week) who have experienced the ups and downs of family life, and can still remember how draining the demands of young children can be.

Could YOU - with your valuable experience in parenting, together with further understanding gained from a preparation course plus the back-up support of the HOMESTART team, help a struggling young family going through a difficult patch?

Could YOU be someone who'd take time to listen, who'd put on the kettle, who'd play with the children, who'd pick up the tea towel and wipe the dishes?

Someone who would care, support and encourage?

All homestart volunteers attend a preparation course.

This is held one morning a week for eight weeks and includes some basic child development, information on community resources, the role of health visitors, social workers etc.

No commitment to the project is expected at that stage: it is after the course that volunteers decide whether they want to go on and take the step of becoming a home visitor. Once visiting, regular, on-going help and advice is available at all times from the project staff.

Volunteers usually work in pairs, driver and assistant, on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays, normally collecting the meals from the school about 5 minutes past noon. During school holidays, the meals are collected from local hotels. The work is not onerous, and can be done in less than an hour. Anyone interested should contact Miss J. Apart from the satisfaction of doing a service for the community, it enables the volunteers to keep in touch with elderly or housebound villagers, which could be vital with the oncoming of winter and cold spells causing hypothermia if not carefully watched.
