



NOTICE:- PERTH & KINROSS DISTRICT COUNCIL.

Disposal of garden refuse and bulky waste.

Following recent complaints of overloading the local skip, please note the following:

Householders are asked to note that the District Council has provided free facilities for the disposal of garden refuse and bulky household items at the Civic Amenities sites at their depots at Friarton Road, Perth. Householders unable to use these facilities may use the following arrangements -

1. Garden waste may be put out for the normal waste collection. The quantity put out should not exceed 3½ cu.ft. and should be contained in a disposable sack. Refuse which cannot be contained in a sack should be tied in bundles to an equivalent volume.
Garden waste must be put out at the pavement for the refuse collectors.
Garden waste does NOT include earth or stones.
2. Bulky items, e.g. furniture, fridges etc., will be removed free of charge by arrangement with the Environmental Health Department, by telephoning Perth 39911 (ext.3325) or Kinross 62351.

COMMUNITY COUNCIL NEWS

A meeting of the Community Council was held on Monday 7th March in the Village Hall, with Chairman J. Lindsay, Secretary R. Tarling, and Councillors Cheape, Hume, Ross and Thompson attending. Apologies were received from Councillors Brough, Millar and Imrie. Also present were Regional Councillor Sir Alan Smith, District Councillor Mrs. Ferrand, and a large body of the general public.

Tennis Club. Mr. Lorne Findlay of the Tennis Club Committee gave the latest details of the proposed new tennis complex to be situated in Wallace Park. So far both sites in Hayfield Road had been sold, as had the Clubhouse. All being well it was hoped that construction of the three new courts would commence about April, being completed in 6 to 8 weeks. Mr. Lindsay asked if the work would conflict with the Annual Fete normally held in June and. Mr. Findlay said he hoped that the work would be completed by then.

Footpath to Crawford Brae along Main Street. The Secretary had written to the Roads Dept. and the matter would be 'put in hand'.

Application for Salt Bin in Duncrievie Road.

This had been refused by the Authorities, due to costs, but it had been stated that the road was given priority after motorways for gritting. A complaint of excess mud from agricultural workings being left on Duncrievie Road had been taken in hand by the Secretary, who had been in touch with the body responsible, and it was hoped that the nuisance would be abated.

Building of New Houses at Elm Row.

The question of unduly heavy lorries using Elm Row to gain access to the new site was raised. A query was made as to whether the roadways in the estate had been 'adopted' by the Regional Council, and Sir Alan Smith stated that enquiry disclosed they had been on 26th January 1988. As this part of Elm Row was a cul-de-sac where toddlers could previously play in safety, grave concern was now expressed for their continued safety in view of the heavy traffic using this part of the road. Mrs. Ferrand, District Councillor, had received numerous letters concerning the matter, as intense feeling was felt by the residents.

Having had to pay to have the road brought up to the required standard for adoption, they felt it was now to be used to their detriment by contractors using it to get to the building site. Mrs. Ferrand, Mr. Lindsay, and two residents near to the building site met Mr. Upton, a Director of the Bridge of Earn Property Co. on the 8th March. Mr. Upton stated that he well understood the concern of the community, but all precautions would be taken to ensure the safety of the children in the area.

Councillors retiring in 1988.

Messrs. Cheaper Brough and Tarling are due to retire after their three years' spell in office. Nomination forms were on hand and these were to be completed and handed to the Secretary by 24th March. By the time this is in print the A.G.M. will have taken place.

Footpath between Village Hall and Old School Playground.

Complaints have been received that youths are using this lane as a cycle track. This is a dangerous practice, which resulted recently in an

elderly person being nearly knocked over, who when remonstrating with the offender 'received a mouthful of abuse'. If the practice does not cease, serious injury could be caused.

Rights of Ways.

At the request of the District Council a sub-committee to deal with this matter was formed, the intention being to reduce the 24 rights of ways to a workable number.

Mr. Hume, Mrs. Thompson, and Mr. McFarlane form the committee.

Old School Playground.

The question of the waste ground which was originally the old school playground (next to the Village Hall) was raised. There is some doubt as to the present owner of the site, and the Secretary stated that enquiries had so far failed to disclose the owner. Mr. Sinclair, a member of the Public present at the meeting, said he would make enquiries when he was in Edinburgh.

Finance sub-committee.

A motion was put forward by the Chairman, seconded by Mr. Hume, that a sub-committee (finance) be formed, this motion being carried unanimously. The sub-committee would be restricted to spending a maximum of £100, any larger sum having to be approved by the full Council. The subcommittee is formed by the Treasurer Mr. Millar, the Chairman Mr. Lindsay, and Councillor Mrs. Thompson.

It was very pleasing to see the large attendance at the 6th March meeting, and it is hoped that this will continue. Council meetings are open to the public, and questions are welcomed from the floor, but items for the Agenda should be in the hands of the Secretary 7 days before a scheduled meeting. Mr. Tarling, Secretary for the past seven years, intimated that he would not be seeking re-election. Mrs. Ferrand, our District Councillor, expressed her thanks, and she felt sure the thanks of all, to Mr. Tarling for the excellent way he had performed his duties during his tenure of office. Mrs. Ferrand said it was always a pleasure to attend Glenfarg Community Council meetings a sentiment also expressed by Sir Alan Smith.

Mrs. Ferrand would also be retiring from duties as District Councillor, as her term of office had come to an end, but she would be offering herself for re-election at the District Council elections which take place on 5th May. The Chairman thanked Mrs. Ferrand for her invaluable help to the Community; she had rarely missed a meeting and was ever ready to assist when called upon.

Do keep up the good work of attending COUNCIL MEETINGS. Apart from being appreciated by the Councillors, it is up to the general public to say how they would like the village to be run.

On the same day P4/5 pupils were visited by Miss Susie Justice, a representative of The Discovery, from Dundee. She brought a video and some exhibits to

show the children, bringing to life much of what the children had already begun to learn about Captain Scott's expedition.

ARNGASK CHURCH NEWS

The fact that I have been Minister of Arngask Church for just some eight weeks and five days is a clear indication of just how new I am in the parish. My wife and I moved into the Abernethy manse on 11th January in time to complete the unpacking of the 125 boxes of goods and chattels from Hong Kong and the arranging of our large furniture which had been stored at a farm in Angus for the previous ten years. On 17th January I was preached into the charge by my old 'bishop' Rev. Everard Kant from Kinghorn to whom I was assistant minister at Bathgate High Church in 1966-67. My first service proper as a minister was on 24th January followed two days later by a joint meeting of

office-bearers of the linked congregations. One practical outcome of this meeting is the holding of united services of the congregations of Arngask and Abernethy with Dron on the last Sunday of each month at 6.30 p.m. and in alternate Churches; the service in Abernethy Church at the end of February was well attended and greatly helped by a considerably augmented choir for the occasion. I commenced visitation of the congregation at the beginning of February accompanied by the district's elder - at present I am in Mr. Hugh Brown's district with seven districts still to be visited. I attended my first Kirk Session meeting on 8th February. The question of elders reading the lessons at Sunday services was raised and I was assured there would be no difficulty as this had been a feature of services in the past. The matter of which translation of the Bible should be used in Church was discussed and I said that I intended to use a variety of translations but with emphasis on the Good News Bible since this translation is available in the pews. Fees for weddings and funeral services in Church were discussed and fixed as follows: Weddings - £15 for the organist plus a fee of £20 for the Church if none of the parties has a connection with Arngask Church; and for Funerals - £10 for the organist but no Church fee. In response to a written suggestion from a member of the congregation, the Kirk Session discussed the possibility of switching the times of the Sunday services between Abernethy and Arngask with the possibility of six month periods of 10.00 a.m. and 11.30 a.m. starts. Reasons given for the switching; were that the Minister has little time in Glenfarg after the 10.00 a.m. service to meet the congregation, and the problem of early morning travelling to Glenfarg in severe winter conditions. The concensus of the Kirk Session members was that it would not be desirable to start making changes during the Minister's first year in the charge but the matter should be kept under review and raised as a formal topic for discussion at the next joint meeting of office-bearers of Arngask and Abernethy. Recently Mr. George Drysdale has accepted an invitation to join the Kirk Session and will be admitted at a confirmation service on Sunday 10th April - Mr. Drysdale is a former elder in St. Andrew's Church, Nairobi. At the same confirmation service on 10th April members of the New Communicants' class currently

meeting at 6.30 p.m. on Sundays will take their vows and several members in the village will re-confirm their vows. If there are any others in the district who are thinking of church membership will they please let in touch with me. Turning to Sunday School matters, Mrs. Kinnaird and Mrs. Neil were presented with teacher-training certificates at a recent service. The teaching material used is the Church of Scotland's Faithquest. One of this term's projects was a poster competition which Arngask Sunday School won at the Perth Presbytery level and now hopes will win again at the final in London. The Sunday School is helping in the aim of greater union between Arngask and Abernethy by joining with Abernethy for a joint Sunday School picnic outing to St. Andrews on Saturday 11th June.

On 14th March the Church held its Annual General Meeting with presentation of accounts by Mr. Gordon Neil, a report on Kirk Session affairs by Mr. George Ross, a slide show by Mr. Ralph Tarling, and the presentation and dedication of a Hall clock donated by the Woman's Guild to mark both a hundred years of the Guild in Scotland and the completion of the Hall extensions. In asking the Minister to accept the clock on behalf of the congregation Miss Isobel Deans, Guild President, said that clocks were very necessary adornments of Halls to keep Guest Speakers within bounds.

In concluding I would like to emphasise my desire to serve the community as a parish minister. Already I have had the privilege of attending school assembly and look forward to meeting children and staff fortnightly on Friday mornings. If there are any pastoral matters including baptisms, weddings, funerals, or counselling then please do not hesitate to get in touch with me, on Abernethy 607.

Caring for the elderly

How many pensioners do you know? Are you perhaps one yourself? Pensioners have a big enough job during the winter months trying to keep out the cold without having to worry about keeping out unwanted visitors such as unscrupulous salesmen, bogus workmen and thieves.

Unfortunately, elderly people are often an easy target for fraudsters and thieves, but a few simple Do's and Don'ts will make life easier for yourself and keep the unwelcome visitors at bay.

DO fit good quality locks on all doors and windows.

DO fit a door chain and door viewers — these will help you keep the unwanted caller at the other side of the door.

DO ask for identification before opening your door.

DON'T keep large sums of money in the house. BANK IT in a Bank or Building Society.

DON'T allow strangers to walk around inside your home.

DON'T give money to salesmen without first checking on the product you are buying. A relation or neighbour may be able to help you here.

IF YOU ARE AT ALL SUSPICIOUS, 'PHONE 999.

Be a good neighbour and keep an eye on the elderly people in your area. If you can advise them regarding security and if you see anyone hanging about their homes acting suspiciously 'phone the police.

HOME WHOM HOME PROJECT

Tayside Social Work Department is launching a Community Respite Project, called 'Home from Home' for elderly people living within the Region.

Elderly people will be given short term stays - from one to three weeks - in private homes of individuals and families ("Community Carers").

The project will give breaks to relatives who are looking after an elderly person at home to allow them, for example, to go on holiday. It will also apply to elderly people living on their own who may welcome a short stay in the warmth of a family home.

The elderly people - men over 65 and women over 60 should be dependent on relations and/or community services.

They could be living alone or with relatives. They must be willing to go on the placement.

He or she will pay something towards their stay, but in some cases they will be able to claim the required amount from the D.H.S.S.

The Community Carers should have a house suitable for an old person. They will be assessed by the project social workers and given some training. They will be expected to include the elderly man or woman in

their family activities and not treat him or her as an invalid. They should have an interest in old people, patience and common sense. They will be given an allowance in the region of £65 per week.

The Community Carer might take a number of placements in a year, either from the same old person or a number of old people.

It is hoped that enough Community Carers will have been recruited by the end of May to enable the booking of placements from that time. Elderly people living in the Perth and Kinross District area wishing to apply should contact either direct or through a relation, District Nurse, Home Help etc., - Duncan Macnaughton, Community Respite Social Worker, Rosslyn House, 32 Glasgow Road, Perth.
