COMMUNITY COUNCIL NEWS

A general meeting of the Council was held in the village hall on Monday 7th Nov, 1988, when 30 members of the public attended, with J.M. Lindsay in the Chair, Councillors, Brough, Millar, Hume, Sinclair, and Mrs J Thompson. Mrs R Ferrand, Dist Cllrs. Apologies received from Cllrs, Ross, Mee, and Mrs A Imrie. Regn Cllr Sir Alan Smith unable to attend being in the Far East on business.

The Chairman opened the meeting stating that it was an "Open", meeting and questions would be taken "from the floor".

Change in Constitution

Due to the increase in the population since the Constitution was formed, it had intimated by the District Council, we could if we wished increase our 9 Cllrs by a further 3. This would require approval of the C.C. at a "special meeting" to be held after the present one, and this being held it was endorsed we apply for the additional Cllrs. This to be ratified or otherwise at the next meeting of the District Council on the 23rd November, 1988.

Perth & Kinross Frame Work Plan for Glenfarg

After much discussion, during which Cllr Sinclair expressed certain reservations about the proposed plan, the chairman declared in order to clarify the situation, could there be a proposal that the plan be endorsed by the C.C. or otherwise. It was proposed by Cllr Thompson, and seconded by Cllr Brough, that the plan "be approved in its framework condition, with any reservations being noted". For the motion, Cllrs Thompson, Brough, Millar and Lindsay. Against Cllr Sinclair, Abstained, Cllr Hume. Motion Carried.

Signposting for Glenfarg

Despite voluminous correspondence with the various bodies, Perth Tourist Board, District Council, Scottish Development Dept., there being nothing positive forthcoming, it was suggested that a letter be sent to our local MP to see if he could initiate some movement in the matter.

Other matters discussed at the meeting were, Flooding in Greenbank Crescent, also the considered unnecessary re kerbing of Greenbank Crescent, dangerous trees in the Main Street, Condition of the River Farg after recent chlorine pollution, possibility of natural gas in the village, underground cables to replace electric lamp standards, and request for a Doctors' surgery in the village, letters concerning all these matters were 'tabled' during the meeting.

Sports Complex in Wallace Park

Cllr Thompson informed the meeting that as a tennis club committee member, she was pleased to inform the meeting that a full grant of 100% i.e. £230 had been received from Perth & Kinross Sports council to assist in the purchase of equipment for the sports complex, thus the C.C. grant of £115 granted at their last meeting would not now be required, but Cllr Millar the treasurer stated that the money would be held 'in abeyance' in case it was needed at a later date. The Chairman thanked Mrs Ferrand for attending, at the same time mentioning that it was encouraging to see the large attendance, and thanked the public for their interest in the C.C. business.

ARNGASK CHURCH - and beyond

Before moving to a wider sphere of the church I would like to express the congregations very sincere thanks to Mr William Scott and Mr Duncan Campbell who recently retired from the Church's property committee after many years service. Both Willie and Duncan have given a great deal of time and material support for the maintenance of the church fabric and church surrounds and they have put us all in their debt. In place of Willie as convenor we welcome Ian Fairweather, already a committee member for some years, Hugh Brown as a new committee member, and continuing member Tom Paton. Following their recent survey of the entire church fabric Ian and Tom's report will be presented at this evening's meeting of the Kirk Session.

Another area of the congregation's responsibilities which is ongoing but perhaps again not always noticed is the representing of the Kirk Session at Perth Presbytery. For more than ten years Ian Barlas has been faithful in attendance at Presbytery meetings and inductions of ministers across the length and breadth of the Presbytery. Ian has been most dutiful and we would like to express the very sincere appreciation of both Session and congregation members. In place of Ian Barlas the Kirk Session appointed Willie Scott as Presbytery Elder. Willie considers his appointment a great honour and privilege. We would like to wish him every success as he represents the interests of Arngask Church.

Now moving to the wider church scene for a change, the Moderator of the General Assembly, the Rt. Rev. Professor James White, began November in Greenock Presbytery before spending a few days with the Navy. At the end of the month he pays his St. Andrewstide visit London and after that tours the Presbytery of England. The Moderator Designate for 1989 has been named as Rev. Bill McDonald of Mayfield, Edinburgh - the church where Professor White served thirty years ago, before moving to St. Andrews where he was, until his retirement last year, Professor of Practical Theology and Christian Ethics.

When nine-year-old David McNicoll, a member of Junior Boys' Brigade at Strathbungo Queen's Park in Glasgow, heard the moving account of the effects of the Sudan Floods he decided sympathy wasn't enough. He organised a fun-run in a neighbouring park and then surprised everyone, including himself, by raising £550 for hospital equipment for Karima. David roped in 100 of his pals and acquaintances to go on the run, talked shopkeepers and business people into donating prizes, got the police on his side as organizers and the persuaded his friend, whose Dad is a musician, to bring along the Salvation Army band to get things off on the right musical note. In addition to David's outstanding achievement - remember he is nine years old - the congregation has sent £600 to the hospital at Karima.

RIVER FARG BIOLOGICAL ASSESSMENT

This report by the Tay River Purification Board concerns the spillage of sulphuric acid from the filter works at Glenfarg, in September, 1987. After the pollution, samples were taken at Hayfield Mill and Nether Mills, (Aberargie) and at each site, animals living on the bed of the river were collected in a fine meshed pond net, using a kicking action to disturb the substrate.

The composition of such samples gives an excellent indication of water quality because the relative tolerance of different animal species to pollution is well known.

At both Hayfield and Nethermills, the abundant supply of diverse fauna was found. Stonefly, mayfly, and caddis larvae were all present indicating a very good water supply. No indication of a previous pollution was found. At Nethermills a salmon parr was caught in the sample suggesting that spawning took place successfully just two months after the spillage. Available evidence therefore, that the river has fully recovered from the effects of the sulphuric acid spillage.

The report is dated the 7th November, 1988, the samples having been taken as recently as 17th August, 1988.

In mid-September the head teacher and staff of Blackford School spent part of their in-service training day with us. They were interested to learn of the extent of parental involvement at Arngask School. Some parents and the Staff chatted to them answering any questions and producing any information required. They were very impressed by the quality and volume of help we receive at our school. They left eager to try some of our ideas which we have found so beneficial.

In late September, primary one pupils had their routine medical screening by the school doctor. Primary one, three and five had their routine hearing tests. And Mrs Strutt, the speech therapist continues to visit us on a regular basis.

The school closed for two weeks at the beginning of October for the annual Autumn holiday. Many teachers felt that the holiday was rather early this year and hope that next year it will be changed to a later date. It seems that the local Perth Monday holiday determines the timing of it.

Parent Contact Evenings took place on the 25th and 26th of October. Parents were given interview times in order to discuss children's progress. It is very encouraging to staff to find that these evenings receive an excellent response.

One of the highlights of the term is that the District Council supplied and planted tulip bulbs in tubs which stand along the front of the school. The children watched and helped with the planting. The bulbs were provided in response to a request by primary 6/7 pupils last session.

Also adding to the school's resources this session is an Automatic Camera and a set of science cards to complete our collection. Our thanks go to the Primary Adviser, Mr Len McConnell for helping us to acquire these.

Our Hallowe'en party was enjoyed by all. The costumes and lanterns were all very well thought out. The children decorated biscuits and enjoyed these with orange juice for their refreshments.

Tickets for our St Andrew's Concert are now on sale. There are to be two performances, the first on Tuesday 29th in the afternoon, and on the evening of Wednesday 30th November. Our thanks go to Mr Reid for assisting us by advertising and selling tickets from the post office.

Several children from primary 6/7 took part in a Cross Country event at Kinross High School on 9th November. They performed very well, with Ian Johnston and Eleanor Brown being well placed. Our thanks go to those parents who helped with organisation and transport.

Unfortunately none of the staff were able to attend as Wednesdays from 3.30 to 5.30 pm are spent on curricular and policy planning matters.

To supplement school funds we are holding a book and toy sale in the school hall on the afternoon of Friday December 9th. We would welcome any donations. Anyone interested in coming along is most welcome. The sale should go under way around 2.00 pm.

As a result of our fund raising efforts over the past year we have managed to purchase science equipment, music books, cooking utensils, tools for craft, netball bibs and several books to build up our resources.

Finally, the first meeting this session of the P.T.A. took place on Monday 14th November. Mrs Watson could no longer serve as she has no children at primary school and Mr Dover resigned due to other commitments. Two members have been co-opted from the list of voting slips received last session. The outcome of the meeting will be circulated to all parents as soon as possible.
