COMMUNITY COUNCIL NEWS

A general meeting of the C.C. was held in the village hall on Wednesday, 4th January 1989, with Chairman J.M. Lindsay, Secretary (awaits appt,) Treasurer R. Millar, and Cllrs, Hume, Sinclair, Ross, Brough, Imrie and Thomson present.

APOLOGIES Received from Dist Cllr, Mrs R. Ferrand, Regn. Cllr, Sir Alan Smith and Cllr Mee. 14 members of the public attended.

The Chairman opened the meeting by declaring the meeting an 'open meeting', and questions would be 'taken from the floor'.

The minutes of the meeting of the C.C. held on 7th November, 1988, having been circulated were approved and signed by the Chairman.

MATTERS ARISING NIL.

CHANGE TO THE CONSTITUTION Due to the increase in population, application has been made to Dist., Council for an additional 3 council members to be approved. This was ratified by the Dist. Council meeting on the 23rd November, 1988. The Chairman stated that there would be a 'special meeting' for Cllrs after the general meeting to consider adopting an additional cllr to take over the office of secretary.

GREENBANK CRESCENT The recent flooding of the crescent it was hoped overcome by the remedial work, done by Dist., and the Regional Council. Criticism was made of the smooth surface of the pavements recently done, as in a heavy frost it was extremely dangerous for the elderly residents nearby to walk on the new surface.

WALLACE PARK Parks & Leisure Dept had promised to replace the wooden flagstaff with a metal one, the car park was to be kerbed, and a new hut for the storage of chairs tables etc, was to be constructed in place of the present dilapidated one, and it was suggested that the new one be placed near the tennis courts to enable the chairs etc to be transported more easily for the functions which take place in the park.

Dual Controls

The Tennis Club were to get in touch with the contractors who constructed the new tennis courts to ask them to expedite the renovation of the boundary dyke they had taken down.

OTHER ITEMS DISCUSSED. Were, 30MPH signs in the village, application for street lighting to be installed in Duncrievie village, Dangerous trees in the Glen and Main Street Glenfarg, Framework plan for Inner Glenfarg, the main part of this being taken up with the objection to the possibility of the erection of public toilets in the old school playground, re-organisation of the Glenfarg Newsletter.

SPECIAL MEETING. The notice to hold such a meeting having been sent to all clrs, the Chmn, stated that the main item on the agenda was to coopt an additional Cllr who was willing to accept the offer of general secretary. Mr George Drysdale of 21 Birch Lane

has been approached and having expressed his willingness to take over the post if coopted, it was proposed by Cllr Lindsay and seconded by Cllr Hume that Mr Drysdale be coopted and this and his apt as secretary was approved unanimously. The appointment of the two additional Cllrs was not considered as March being the AGM, it would be pointless in coopting as they would have to stand for re-election. The Chairman stated that it would be beneficial to the C.C. in having a vice-chairman, and it was proposed that Cllr John Sinclair be offered the position on his being willing, the proposal was passed unanimously.

The treasurer supplied details of the financial position of the Newsletter account, which he declared was in a 'healthy' condition.

DATE OF NEXT GENERAL MEETING Will be WEDNESDAY 1st March 1989, and will be the AGM when it is hoped there will be a large turnout of the public.

The retiring Cllrs after their 3 year period are Cllrs Ross, Hume and Imrie. Mrs Ann Imrie is not seeking re-election, Cllrs Ross and Hume are willing to stand, and should there be a need for an election, notification of the date will be announced at the A.G.M. where nomination papers will be available.

If you feel like nominating a person you think would make a responsible Cllr, do come along to the Annual General Meeting on March 1st and collect a nomination form.

GLENFARG RIGHTS OF WAY. A farmyard route which has been used as a pedestrian right-of-way for over 50 years, has been given recognition by Perth & Kinross District Council. It had been asked by the Community Council planning committee to investigate the use and status of the 1 mile long walk over Yellowhill which offers superb views of the Lomond Hills, Strathearn, and Loch Leven. The committee heard that, according to documented evidence, the road had been used by the local community for many years. It also links two public roads. The proprietors offered no objection to its continued use, providing the Countryside Code was observed. The District Council were also asked to investigate the use of Paris Bridge to the Old Manse, via the church and graveyard at Arngask. The path has been used by the local community for many years. The walk is around half a mile long and stretched from the public road and follows the field boundary up the hill and through the wood to Arngask Church at the top of the hill. The church was closed in 1948 and is now derelict. The planning committee are to investigate the use and status of other walks in the district this year.



ARNGASK PRIMARY SCHOOL

During the Autumn term several children in primary 3-4 received letters from pupils in St Paul's School Baltimore U.S.A. where, Mrs Bruce's daughter Gail teaches. Replies have been posted, and we are looking forward to hearing from our pen-pals again in the near future.

Throughout November each class was very busy rehearsing for the St Andrew's Night concerts. Items on the programme included sketches, songs, dances, playground games and instrumental compositions. The school Christmas dinner was served on Tuesday December 20th. Nearly every child in the school attended. An extra attraction was a visit by Santa afterwards, who gave out sweets to everyone. The children also received apples and oranges which were generously donated by Mr Reid from the Post Office.
