

UPDATE by Councillor Lena Graham

Planning applications continue to pour into the District Council Planning Department and they tend to be fairly time consuming for the local councillor.

There are 16 homes at Greenbank Cres., Greenbank Road, and Hayfield Road, Glenfarg that are to be given replacement doors and windows. These houses were built during the 1950's.

Dead Elms in Glenfarg have been taken seriously by the District Council, and John Freeman in the Planning Department has now managed to establish ownerships of the various pieces of land in that area. He has contacted the individual owners and is now awaiting replies from them. Some work has already started, however, and it is hoped that soon many more of the dead trees will be cut down and cleared away.

I have tried to attend most of the Community Council meetings, and would like to remind everyone that I am available before these meetings for individual problems.

It is very important that the local people attend the Community Council Meetings to make their feelings known and to contribute to the proceedings as members of that Community.

## COMMUNITY COUNCIL NEWS

The C.C. held their bimonthly meeting on 6th November 1989, in the village hall, Cllr J.M. Lindsay in the Chair. Present were G. Drysdale, Secretary, and Clrs Mrs J. Thompson, S. Mee, A. McFarlane, G. Ross, J. Sinclair. Also present Mrs L. Graham, District Councillor. Apologies for absence received from Cllrs Brough, Mrs Baird, and Sir Alan Smith, Regional Cllr.

15 members of the public present.

The minutes of the meeting of 4th Sept. 1989 were confirmed as correct, but Cllr Sinclair sought clarification of the 2nd para of Minute 52/89 relating to the application of the word 'infill'. Cllr Thompson, in reply, confirmed that the wording of the minute correctly applied to the use of the word 'infill', to development on the outskirts of the village.

Cllr Thompson observed that, with reference to Minute 60/89, her question had referred to the use of untreated sewage as fertiliser on a local farm. The chairman commented that this had not contributed to the silting up of the River Farg. The minutes were then signed by the Chairman.

## PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT

Application for the erection of a stud farm at Arngask had, at the request of the local D.C., been deferred, in order that the applicant could supply additional details as to the future development of the site.

## DANGEROUS TREES IN THE GLEN

Mrs. Graham, DC, reported that some trees (the property of the Eagle Star Insurance Company) in the Glen, had been cut down. Hopefully the remainder of the dangerous ones would follow, when their owners had been traced.

## RIGHTS OF WAY SUB COMMITTEE

With the departure of Ian Hume, Chairman of the sub committee, from the village, it was necessary to appoint a new Chairman. Cllr. McFarlane was so-appointed, and it was proposed that Cllr. Brough be approached to be the third member. Cllr. Brough declined. It is hoped that the vacancy will be filled at the next C.C. meeting. A letter from ex Cllr. Hume was read out to the meeting saying that despite the fact he was no longer resident in Glenfarg he would still have an interest in the R.of Ways of the village, and hoped that the interest which had been shown would be sustained.

## WALLACE PARK

The Chairman reported on an inspection of the park by the Parks Dept. official, discussion leading to the matter of an area for the exercise of dogs, but it was felt, after discussion at the C.C. meeting, that it was unfair on non-dog owners to lose part of the park for this purpose. Consideration was given to the provision of a designated area for the exercise of dogs in the triangle of land West of the sewage works at Paris bridge. The problem at present is who owns this strip of land. The Chairman reported that there is now a dog warden in Perth, and it is hoped that he will make periodic visits to the park to deal with offenders.

## GLENFARG NEWSLETTER

It was announced that the Editor, Mrs. Buchan and the typist, Miss Scott, both wished to relinquish their posts, the Chairman expressing thanks for the work they had performed in the past. Mrs. Jan MacPherson has agreed to take over both positions.

## GLENFARG SMALL GARDEN COMPETITION IN 1990

It was agreed in principle that an annual event in the form of the above competition be held, to stimulate local environmental pride. Details to be worked out and submitted for approval at the next C.C. meeting.



CONVENTION OF PERTH AND KINROSS DISTRICT COMMUNITY COUNCILS

Dear Editor,

The October issue of your Newsletter featured a report on the Convention's half-yearly meeting. As an officer of the Convention I feel that the report portrayed our proceedings in a rather poor light. I would, therefore, appreciate an opportunity, through the medium of your newsletter, to state our aims and to comment briefly on some of the points made in the report.

The Convention was formed in 1980 by 18 Community Councils in the Perth and Kinross District. In these early days of Community Councils it was felt that communications between ourselves and the two tiers of Local Government needed improvement. A need was also identified for a forum where matters of common concern could be debated, and experiences shared. The Convention was seen as a means of collective action which would complement and support the actions of individual Community Councils.

The success of the Convention may be judged by the fact that 23 of the District's 42 Community Councils are currently members. Our meetings are well attended and, as already reported, there is never a lack of topics to debate. I noted with interest that the report on the Convention in the October Newsletter was given more space than any other article in that issue. One could reasonably infer from this that the topics debated by the Convention are both relevant and of interest to communities such as Glenfarg.

Although the Convention is on occasions critical of the District Council, they have always supported us well. To my knowledge this is the first meeting in 8 years where the District Council has not been represented. In this case Provost Murray sent his apologies for not being able to attend.

The threat of closure to Cottage Hospitals is a matter of ongoing concern to rural communities and this topic has been regularly debated at Convention Meetings. With this in mind it was felt that representation on the Health Council would ensure awareness of any new developments in this matter. Because the numbers appointed to the Health Council are limited, it was considered that the Convention could provide a focal point for all Community Councils. It was on this basis that our application to join the Health Council was made to the Health Board.

With regard to the large scale development being proposed at Moneydie, the delegate who raised the topic had expressed concern that the development was not in response to any identified local need. As evidence of this he stated that the development was being advertised as far afield as the South of England. The local community are more willing to accept their share of local (District) development but are opposed to large scale development which appears to benefit the developers but offers little to the local community.

As a voluntary body the Convention must rely on its powers of persuasion to support the role of the Community Councils. It is, therefore, important for us to be recognised as a serious body

Mr. Drysdale comments:

"My report of the Convention's half-yearly meeting, which you published in October, was a personal impression of the proceedings - an impression from which our Chairman did not dissent. It was written in a style intended to entertain as well as to inform, as I'm sure readers will readily recognise. Mr. Spilsted does not question the factual accuracy of my report".

#### Do we have a COMMUNITY Council?

Over the last twelve months the meetings of our Community Council have been well attended by the villagers whom it represents. There has been serious discussion, some amusing moments, some vigorous disagreement and occasionally some harmony.

Last week there was only a handful of people in the village hall to witness the short meeting of the Community Councillor: They sat in front of the Council like an audience. They took little part in the proceedings and were unable to assist the Council in any decisions it might take.

The change that has taken place, from a lively debate involving village people and their Council, to an audience hearing a brief discussion among a few Council members, makes me very sad. When I joined the Community Council two and a half years ago I was delighted to find that the Chairman and Councillors were keen to encourage more

villagers to attend meetings. There was an eagerness to seek opinions from the community at large about the issues which affect us all. These issues include pollution of the River Farg, public rights of way for walking, plans to keep the village free of dog dirt, public bus services, applications for planning permission which may spoil Glenfarg, and many more besides. I was very pleased to see so many people interested enough in these things to come to the Council meetings. The comments, views and debate at the well-attended meetings were invaluable to the Council. The decisions taken were a real reflection of how the Community felt. We had a real COMMUNITY council.

The meetings are now less well attended. The reason is that the Chairman now uses one of the rules of the Council to stop the village people speaking. The terms of the Community council constitution state that members of the public may only speak if they apply for prior permission, or if the whole Council wishes them to speak. This rule is now being strictly applied. At the September meeting those who rose to offer comment were ruled out of order. Their manner was orderly and polite. Their contributions, I am sure, were valuable. But we were not allowed to hear them. The rule which has silenced villagers in Council meetings is not a new one. It is simply being interpreted strictly, and assumes that the whole Community council does not want to hear the views of those who live in the village. Up to September of this year, it had always been assumed that the whole Council did want to hear how everybody felt.

I think it is impossible for the Community Council to attempt to take decisions on the issues affecting the village if the views of those living in Glenfarg are not available at Council meetings. I also think it is wrong for the Council to try to do this.







## REPEAT PRESCRIPTIONS

A note of the items required, and a stamped, addressed envelope if the prescription is to be posted back, should be enclosed. This should be done ONE WEEK before existing medicines run out. If delivered to the surgery by 1p.m., prescriptions will be ready for collection by 11 a.m. the following morning.

## SATURDAY MORNINGS

Prescriptions may be uplifted on Saturday morning if ordered before 11 p.m. on Friday. ND ORDERS will be taken for prescriptions on a Saturday, and AT NO TIME WILL PRESCRIPTION REQUESTS BY TELEPHONE BE ACCEPTED.

## IMMUNISATION CLINICS

As from Tuesday 1 August, 1989, KINROSS Immunisation Clinics will be on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday afternoons by appointment. The clinics will be run by the Practice Nurses and Health Visitors, under the supervision of the Doctors. 
