Editorial

Community Council

The following is an extract from the minutes of the Community Council meeting held on Monday 4 May, at which 2 members of the public were present.

The Chairman brought to the attention of the meeting the sad death of Liz Stewart, who was well known for her work as District Nurse in Glenfarg for many years.

PROPOSED KARTING TRACK There is a proposal for an all terrain Karting Track at Lochelbank Farm, Wicks of Baiglie. The track will be environmentally friendly, and will use portable toilets and offices, so that no structure will be erected on the site. It is hoped that the track will be open 40 weeks of the year. A maximum of 6 karts will run at any one time, with at least 4 members of staff to act as marshals, with at least 3 positioned on the track. A qualified First Aider is on the staff. Directional lights, approximately 10 feet tall, will be used when dark. Fuel is to be stored in steel containers, with a fire extinguisher on each door. It is hoped to attract the general public as well as corporate business, which should generate local business in the village. Various concerns were raised, and the developers stressed that all these aspects had been given consideration. A demonstration for councillors and members of the public is to be arranged.

Neighbourhood Watch

TREE WARDEN SCHEME The Headmaster has agreed to involve the children in monitoring the progress of the trees planted in the school grounds.

WASTE DUMPING There was general agreement about the untidiness of the Glen at the moment, and the regular dumping of waste in the Glen. PC West pointed out that this was often carried out by bogus workmen unwilling to pay commercial rates to use the skip. He suggested members of the public should report any suspicious dumping to the police. It was agreed that the Secretary should write to the Director of planning to co-ordinate future plans for the Glen. Cllr. MacNeill suggested a millennium exercise whereby the Community Council could approach landowners to look at grants available for improving woodland to provide an attractive walkway or cycle track along the Glen.

DOG FOULING The problem of dog fouling, particularly along Main Street and Greenbank road, was raised. The Secretary is to approach P&K Environmental Consumer Services for advice.

WREATH The theft of the wreath from the War Memorial was reported

VANDALISM PC West urged members of the public to report instances of vandalism to the police.

co-ordinators of the Neighbourhood Watch Schemes. Kinross Police have three constables who are Community Liaison Officers, and each has a responsibility for a part of the Kinross section, Constable Steve West being responsible for Glenfarg, as well as Crook of Devon, Powmill, Blairingone and Cleish. These Officers will liaise with the co-ordinator of the Neighbourhood Watch Scheme in their area, and keep them up-to-date with matters that may affect their schemes. We

hope that this will improve the communication between the Police and the Neighbourhood Watch Schemes, but we would welcome any suggestions that would be of mutual benefit.

Recently things have been comparatively quiet in the Kinross section. On the negative side there have been a few minor break-ins, and some thefts and vandalism. Over the past few months in the Kinross area there have been some thefts of quad bikes, and although we realise that these are not the sort of items normally found about the home, we would appreciate any information that would assist us to trace the culprits.

On a more positive note, a recent spate of sneak-in thefts has been cleared up, and one person has been reported to the Procurator Fiscal.

With regard to our constant fight against crime, initiatives are ongoing to combat disorderly conduct and to deter the dropping of litter. We hope to join in a campaign operating in the Perth & Kinross area to stamp out vandalism to schools, and would urge anyone, particularly those who live near, or whose houses overlook, schools to report anything that may assist us.

Now that the clocks have changed, and summer is fast approaching, we would like to remind you about leaving garden equipment/furniture, childrens' toys and cycles lying out overnight, and of the need to secure your outbuildings. Warn the kids about leaving their bikes lying about, and give serious consideration to having them (the bikes, not the kids) stamped with your postcode.

BOGUS WORKMEN We have chosen this subject because it is the time of year when our attentions turn to the garden, and possibly to having some home improvements, for which we might consider some expert assistance. For every expert, however, there will be a bogus workman/con man who will offer attractive cut price work, but in reality he will try to rip you off, and in many cases will get away with it. We would like you to pay extra attention to our elderly residents, to prevent them being the victims of these unscrupulous individuals. Please note that Council employees, and Water, Electricity and Gas employees, have been instructed to show their identification without being asked, and if they do not do so, be suspicious.

CONTACTING THE HEALTH CENTRE

Appointments may be made by telephoning Kinross 862112, or calling into the Health Centre from 8.15am until 6pm, Monday to Friday. Patients are requested to wait until after 10am before telephoning for test results and on other matters. This is to free the telephone lines for those wishing appointments. Anyone telephoning between 8.15am and 10am, other than to make an appointment or to ask for a house call, may be asked to call back after 10am. We have three telephone lines taking incoming calls, and prefer to keep them all free for appointments during this period of peak patient demand.

Surgery consultations are strictly by appointment only. Patients presenting as urgent cases (to relieve pain or suffering) will be seen the same day as an emergency appointment, but it may not be with the doctor with whom you are registered. Routine appointments will be given the first available time, and if this is not suitable, an earlier appointment with another one of the doctors of the same practice may be offered. Please let us know when you have to cancel an appointment, in order that we may offer it to another patient.

If you are unable to attend the surgery and need the doctor to visit you at home, please telephone Kinross 862112 before 10am whenever possible. Please remember that home visits are for serious illnesses and people who cannot travel to the Health Centre - the doctor can see 3 or 4 patients at the surgery in the time it takes to do one home visit.
