

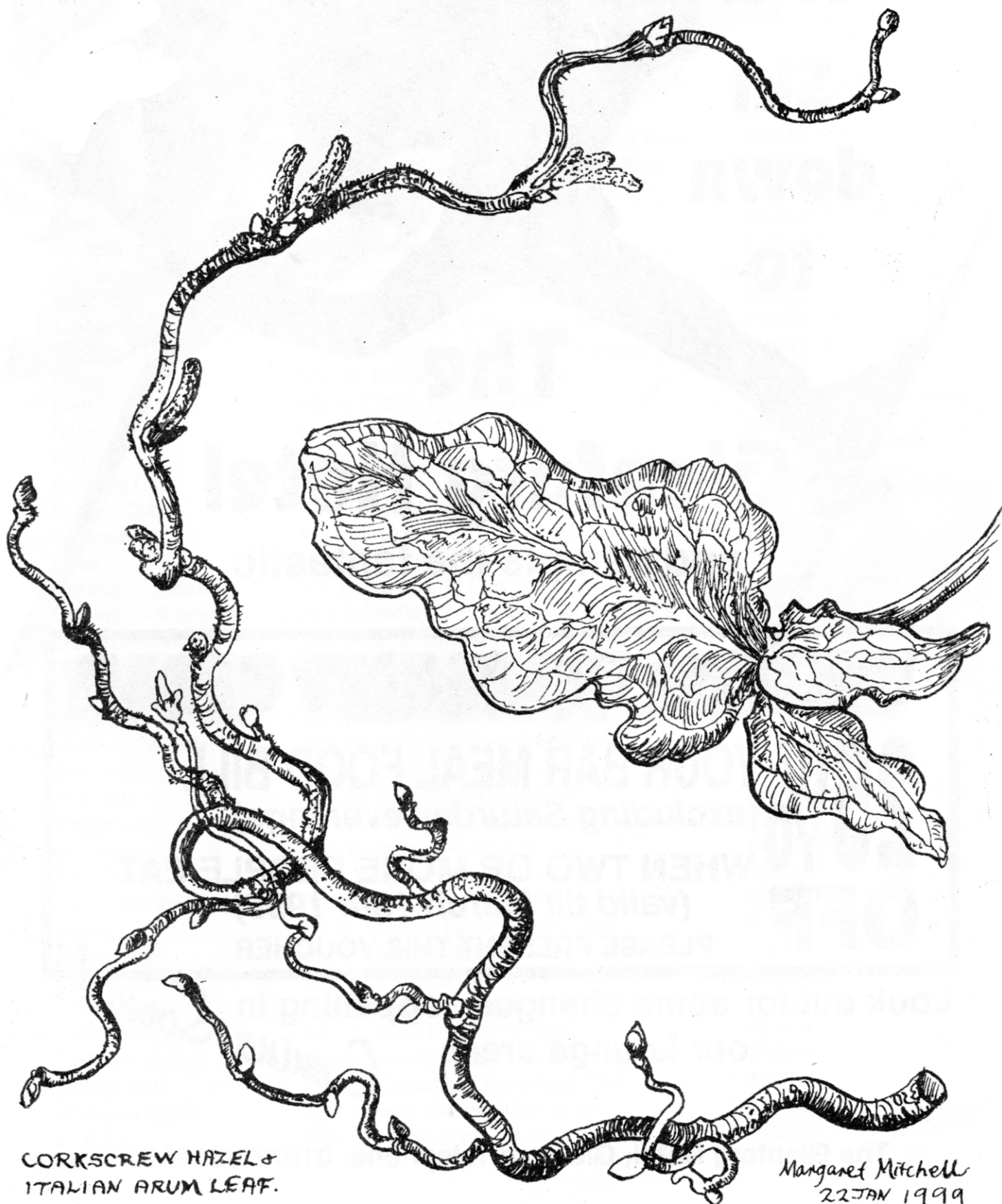

Front Cover

Having been away in Egypt for the first half of January, I walked round the Bank House garden on my return, to see what I could find to draw for this newsletter cover. There was far less to choose from than this time last year, when flowers were rashly early. The snow drops and Christmas roses still had their heads sensibly wrapped in tight bud, reminding me of the Egyptian men who wear scarves as well as turbans round their heads in winter.

The one glorious exception is the Witch Hazel, *HAMAMELLIS MOLLIS*, growing in the far corner of Glenfarg Green, which is a riot of narrow, curing yellow petals, fiendishly difficult to draw. So I chose a twig of the Corkscrew Hazel, “*CORYLUS AVELLANA CONTORTA*”, also known as Harry Lauder’s Walking Stick. It was first discovered in a Gloucestershire hedgerow in 1863. Whilst drawing its eccentric loops I

remembered the quote from the artist Paul Klee (I think) “Taking a line for a walk”. What a very squiggly walk indeed!

That done there was still space to fill, so I picked a leaf from my favourite Italian arum “*ARUM ITALICA PICTUM*”. Pict means painted, so perhaps we should rename it the Pictish Arum. Its wonderful marbled, cream-veined leaves, so dramatic in a flower arrangement, come thrusting up undeterred by snow and frost. It looks far too exotic to be so cheerfully hardy. It is related to our native Lords and Ladies, and its hooded flower in spring turns into a stunning show of orange berries, tightly clustered round each thick stem by autumn.

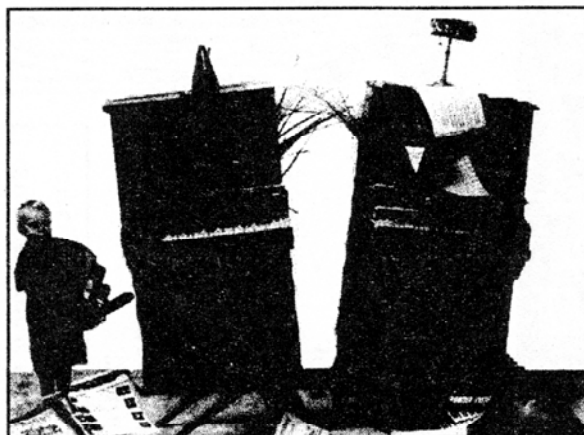

The purpose of having a Community Liaison Officer is to enable the local community to have a point of contact with the Police to whom they can direct their concerns, whether it be speeding traffic, vandalism, youth disturbances, damaged road signs etc. If anybody in the Glenfarg area has a non-urgent problem which they wish to discuss with me, they can contact me at the Kinross Police Office (01577) 863571. If I am not on duty and the problem can wait, then I will deal with it on my return to duty.

Anything of an urgent nature should be passed to the Police straight away.

I mentioned in the last newsletter that Arngask School would welcome input from any residents who may have had interesting or noteworthy experiences in the past. I'm sure the children would enjoy hearing of some of these exploits. If anyone is interested contact me at Kinross Police Station, and let me know.

As I write this the Perth & Kinross area has been buffeted by severe gales, resulting in damage to houses and outbuildings. As a result your house may have suffered more than most. Whether it be a loose tile or something more serious, you may be requiring the services of a builder or a roofer. My advice is to make sure you choose a reputable firm before contracting anybody to do work, and to make sure that the price you are quoted is the price you pay.

Every year I hear of unsuspecting homeowners paying astronomical bills to bogus workers, and unfortunately it is usually the elderly who are targeted.

As a rule of thumb, bogus workers usually approach you for work!!!!

If in doubt contact the Police straight away, and we will check these people out, and do our best to keep the rogue element at bay.

From Councillor Law

Glenfarg

Environmental Group I am very pleased that an Environmental Group has been established to look at issues of concern in and around the village. I walked down the Glen with members of the group who were involved in noting matters to be dealt with. I hope to work with the group in the future.

Pre School Education The Playgroup has entered into a partnership with the Council to provide free half day places in nursery education.

Road Safety As part of the plan for new housing to the south of the village, the Community Council suggested that a safer walking route to Duncricvie could be provided. I argued for this to be included

in the Local Plan, but it may be many years until new housing is built. In the meantime I have asked for better road signs for Duncricvie to remind everyone to slow down.

Road Repairs Further work has been done on Greenbank Road after the winter.

Young People I have had requests for more provision for young people, and have asked the Council's Community Education Services what can be done. Anyone interested contact Shaun Bartlett, Community Education, Blackfriars, Perth 01738 476319.

Perth & Kinross Council

Partnership with Parents Perth & Kinross Council was featured on TV last year, when all our schools published their annual reports. The Council's Schools and Education Services have worked hard to achieve a common, agreed way of being accountable to parents. All parents now receive information about what their own child's school has achieved over the past year, and what it is aiming to achieve in the next year. This is the Council's way of ensuring accountability to parents, and quality of provision across our schools. Teachers work very hard throughout the year to support our young people, and our schools' annual reports to parents show the results of all the hard work by teachers and pupils.

A Childcare Strategy for Perth and Kinross

Perth & Kinross Council are drawing up a strategy for childcare, and consulting with those who have an interest in the planning and provision of childcare. The aim will be to ensure quality, affordable childcare provision, and better availability of information for parents. Working parents often need reliable out of school care and holiday playschemes. Parents of younger children may look for something more than the free half day of education to which all four year olds are now entitled, and which will increasingly be available for three year olds too. In rural areas playgroups and out of school care can be particularly difficult to organise because of the small numbers. We need a strategy which will help to make this provision sustainable.

School Buildings Perth & Kinross Council have been making a strong case to Government,

supported by our MP, Roseanna Cunningham, for the particular needs of our area. In Perth & Kinross we have a growing population, with growing numbers of school age children, but Government has restricted the amount of money that the Council can borrow for capital investment. It has, therefore, been accepted that we have to pursue a so called “Private Finance Initiative” deal for the priorities for new schools in Auchterarder and Abernethy, which the Council inherited from the former Tayside Region. The PFI proposal needs agreement from the Scottish Office. So far the Scottish Office has not accepted the proposals, but we will not give up. Perth & Kinross Council is still working hard to improve school security as a response to the recommendations of the Cullen Enquiry, and to increase the numbers of computers in schools.

Community Council

The following is an extract of the minutes of the Community Council meeting held on Monday 11 January 1999.

TREASURER’S REPORT Cllr. Murison (Treasurer) has found appropriate marquee insurance, which it was unanimously agreed should be applied for.

POLICE REPORT PC Steve West stated that he was willing to contribute to the Glenfarg newsletter, and is keen for the contribution of others. He is enthusiastic about liaising with local people on any policing matters.

PROPOSED YOUTH CLUB FOR UNDER 14s The meeting was attended by Community Development Youth Worker, Shaun Bartlett, who is based in Perth. He would like to start a Youth Club in Glenfarg, and has established paid staff for the purpose. He has to identify local volunteers and premises, and hopes that young people and parents will involve themselves in the project. Shaun Bartlett can be contacted in Perth. Please see Secretary, Rachel Webb, for details if interested in providing support.

ARMISTICE DAY The Chairman has been informed that many of the groups who have always attended the service on Armistice Day would be grateful if sufficient warning could be provided next year for any changes in the timing of the proceedings by the Church.

BEST KEPT VILLAGE Glenfarg has a certificate and cup as the winner of the Kinross-shire Best

Kept Village competition in the summer. The certificate requires to be appropriately displayed, and the Secretary is to liaise with appropriate persons accordingly.

FOOTPATHS The feasibility of creating a map of local “rights of way” was discussed. After much debate, it was agreed that individual walks required liaison with appropriate landowners before they could be established successfully. Dr. Moiser agreed to look into one such walk, and hopes to establish other recreational walks in future. It was emphasised that all walkers require to be aware of the countryside code, for example closing gates, awareness of crops etc.

NOTELETS The council agreed to remove the Community council name from the Glenfarg Notelets.

SCOTTISH WATER REPRESENTATIVE

Rachel Webb (Secretary) agreed to be a local contact person.

LAND AT REAR OF HALL Top soil to be supplied by Colin Campbell is scheduled for March. Volunteers for this “hands on” job would be most welcome.

CONVENTION OF PERTH & KINROSS COMMUNITY COUNCILS It was agreed that after a period of lapsed membership, the Glenfarg Community Council should rejoin for a fee of £5.

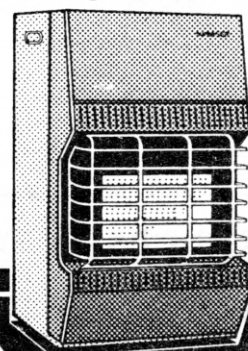

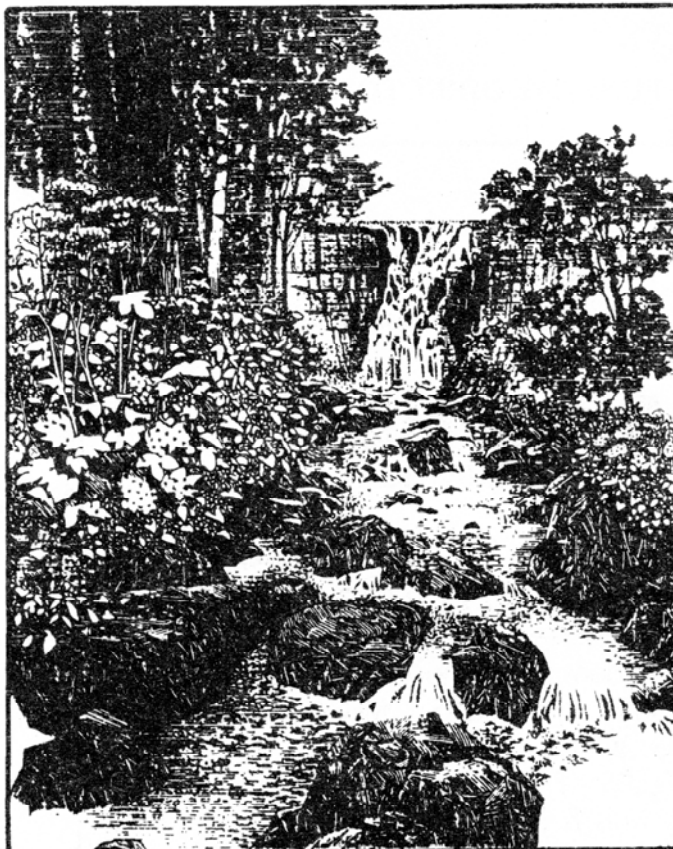

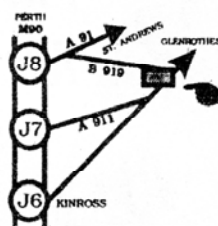

Anyone telephoning between 8.15am and 10am, other than to make an appointment or to ask for a house call, may be asked to call back after 10am. We have three telephone lines taking incoming calls, and prefer to keep them all free for appointments during this period of peak patient demand.

Surgery consultations are strictly by appointment only. Patients presenting as urgent cases (to relieve pain or suffering) will be seen the same day as an emergency appointment, but it may not be with the doctor with whom you are registered. Routine appointments will be given the first available time, and if this is not suitable, an earlier appointment with another one of the doctors of the same practice may be offered. Please let us know when you have to cancel an appointment, in order that we may offer it to another patient.

If you are unable to attend the surgery and need the doctor to visit you at home, please telephone Kinross 862112 before 10am whenever possible. Please remember that home visits are for serious illnesses and people who cannot travel to the Health Centre - the doctor can see 3 or 4 patients at the surgery in the time it takes to do one home visit.

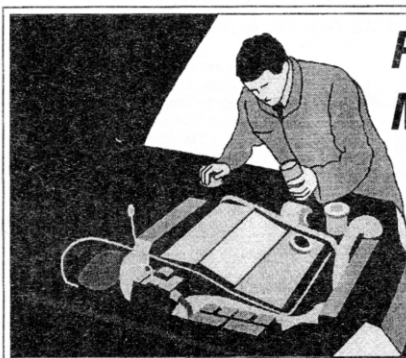

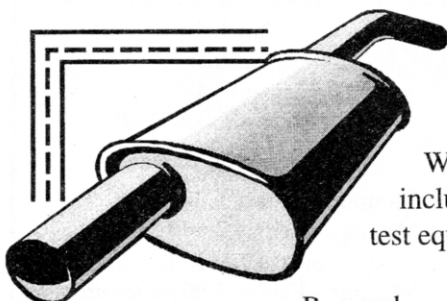

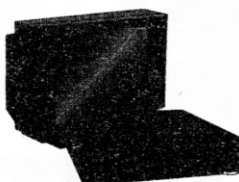
