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
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Top awards for Glenfarg Beavers

PLEASE think hard about whether you can spare a bit of time to help..you'd be very welcome and we can find a portfolio for everyone..!!







Dear Friends,

The build-up to Christmas has come upon us again, that time when we get caught up in a frenzy of preparation for the "big day". What presents will I buy for the children who have "Christmas" every week? What food will I buy?

(frozen or fresh turkey this year)? Will I be able to avoid the last-minute rush (remember last year)? Have we enough booze in? Will we invite Auntie Gertie this year? (last year she ate hardly anything, drank the gin and slept all afternoon on the chair). And on and on it goes. Christmas 2012

As usual, December is a busy month for the Church. Our preparation starts off at the morning service on 2nd December (Advent Sunday) when

the children (and adults) bring along gifts which will be distributed to those less well off families in Perth who might otherwise not receive a gift at Christmas. This service takes place at the normal time of 11am. That evening at 7pm there will be an Advent Service in the Church. This is being organised by Lower Earn Churches Together (LECT) and will be led by the ministers from the 3 parishes. This is an annual service and this year it is the turn of Arngask to host it. Two weeks later on the 16th December at 6.30pm we will be holding our annual Christingle Service in the Church. All young people are invited to bring a Christingle with them. The proceeds from this service will go to the Children's Society (Charity Registration No. 221124). On Christmas Eve there will be Carol Singing in The Village Hall at 6pm followed by mulled wine, soft drinks and mince pies. Later, at 11.30pm, we will be having our annual Watchnight Service in the Church. As last year, this will take the form of Nine Lessons and Carols, with the lessons being read by different members of our village community. The offering at the service will, as usual, go to the Glenfarg Branch of Riding for the Disabled (Scottish Charity Number



SCO39473).

There will not be a service on Christmas Day. Finally, a reminder that from Sunday 6th January all Sunday morning services at Arngask will start at 9.30am until the end of 2013.



Don't crack up this winter - wrap up!

Although winter is now most definitely upon us, it's still not too late to help ensure you make it through to spring without the mess, expense and chaos of burst pipes.



Local plumber Richard Tulloch explained that a few small steps can help avoid frozen and cracked pipes, and the flooding the thaws can brings: "Dripping water increases the risk of freezing, so have any leaks repaired as soon as you discover them. If freezing has occurred, isolate the affected area by closing the stopcock on that supply."

Richard added: "It's important to thaw out frozen pipes carefully. Blowtorches and heaters directly aimed at the pipes can cause more damage than the original burst. Instead, gentle heat from a hairdryer or heat pack may do the trick."

Beat the winter freeze. Richard's top tips:

- Make sure you know the location of your stopcock so you can reach it quickly in an emergency. (Tip: It's often under the kitchen sink.)
- Turn off water to outside taps and leave tap open.
- If you are away for a few days, leave the heating on low.
- If your house will be empty for a long period drain down the plumbing system.
- Insulate your loft and lag exposed water pipes.
- Keep your local emergency plumber call out number beside the phone.

French Night at the Cinema

A little bit of France came to Glenfarg Community Cinema in November, with the showing of the classic film 'Rififi' – which roughly translates as 'trouble' or 'pitch battle'.



Audience members were greeted at the door by mime artiste Rachel – with a red rose and silent communication that overcame any language barriers. Signs and posters had been rewritten in French by P6/7 at Arngask Primary School as part of their weekly lessons. They helpfully supplied pictures to go with the signs, so no one should have been left in any confusion. On entering L'Ecran d'Un (Screen One) the hall had been turned into a French café, with live accordion music supplied by Margaret.

Before the main feature, we saw a video made for us by the P6/7 french class, some of whom had come along to see themselves on 'the big screen'. There were even a couple of our youngest members there for this special entertainment, all ready in their pyjamas to be whisked off to bed afterwards. Our cinema certainly is becoming a home from home.



'Rififi' had us enthralled, with everyone holding their breath for the 30 minutes of the jewel heist which was played out without music or dialogue – the longest such scene in cinema history. Anyone clinking a wine glass or crunching a breadstick was immediately shushed – I wouldn't have been surprised if the characters themselves had looked down from the screen in disapproval at any miscreant!

Directed by Jules Dassin, the black-and-white film was shot on location on a very low budget. Dassin, who had been blacklisted from Hollywood as a result of the McCarthy era, waited for rain before shooting the exterior scenes – wanting to capture the reflections from the lamps in the cobbled Paris streets.

After the successful heist, we stopped for an interval of cheeses, meringues and profiteroles, supplied by Alice, accompanied by the wine and cafetieres of coffee. Then it was back to the film, to see if the gang had got away with it.

Old Foggie warms up by degrees

If you want to know how the weather affects the world around us, its worth spending a moment or two to consider the degree-day. This handy weather tool pops up in the strangest of places; from timing the delivery of your heating oil to estimating when the May blossom will appear.



Plants need heat in order to germinate and grow and there is a base temperature below which they will not grow. For hardy vegetables this minimum temperature is about 5°C, and for half hardys, such as French beans and sweet corn, it is 10°C. So 1 degreeday is 1°C above this minimum temperature in a 24 hour period. The more degree-days, the faster the plants will grow.

To calculate degree-days all you need is a min-max thermometer. Find the average daily temperature by adding the minimum and maximum values and dividing your answer by two. Then subtract the minimum temperature for growth and what you are left with is the degree-days for that particular day. Replace any minus numbers with a zero.

Looking at last April for instance, seeds planted straight out into the soil did not

do well. For Glenfarg, April 2012 saw a measly 61 degree-days. April 2009 managed 138 degree-days and April 2010, 148 degree-days. Using historical records of degree-days, and knowing how many degree-days are needed for a crop to reach maturity, horticulturalists can plan planting successions to produce a steady supply of vegetables.

My good friend, H.R. Oobit, the well known raconteur and bat aficionado, informs me that degree-days are useful in ecology, relating life cycles to the weather. They help to explain, for instance, when trees come into leaf, when insects appear and how climate change is affecting the relationships between plants and animals.

For any member of the Wine Club scouting out a local slope on which to plant a few vines, the degree-day is not your friend. Over 1000 degree-days are required before vines produce grapes suitable for wine production. This year Glenfarg only clocked up 524 degree-days from January to the end of October. Taking global





warming into account, and extrapolating this year's figures to 2050, the total would just about reach 600 degree-days.

Dream on folks.

Recipe of the season

Bridal Slice

This recipe is for a traditional traybake that was once served up as part of a wedding feast. Bridal Slice is delicious with a cup of tea, and good for winter parties as a lighter alternative to Christmas Cake. It is fairly easy to make, especially if you don't mind using ready-made pastry, marzipan and ready-to-roll icing. Any plain biscuit or even shortbread crumbs would work just as well in place of digestives. Once the cake is iced leave it to settle (overnight if possible) before cutting into slices or squares.



Ingredients:

Shortcrust pastry made with 200g Flour and 100g Butter, 15g Caster Sugar and 2-3tblsp Water. For the cake layer: 60g Butter (softened to room temperature) 115g Caster Sugar 2 Medium eggs 8 Digestive biscuits crushed to give 100g Crumbs 115g Glace Cherries (rinsed, dried and quartered, 225g Currants **1tsp Mixed Spice** 1tbsp Whisky or Sherry as preferred (optional) For the icing: 2-3tbsp Apricot Jam 225g Marzipan 1 tblsp whisky, brandy or boiled water to brush marzipan 225g Pre-made ready to roll icing.

Method:

Prepare the pastry as usual, allow it to chill for about 30 minutes, then roll out thinly and use to line a 23cm x 32cm (approx) baking tray.
 Cream together the softened butter and sugar until light and fluffy, then beat in the eggs one at a time. Fold in the biscuit crumbs, cherries, currants, mixed spice and finally the whisky or sherry if used. Spread evenly over the pastry. Bake in a pre-heated oven at 170°C / 340°F for approximately 45 minutes until golden brown and firm to touch.
 Leave to cool completely before brushing the top with warmed apricot jam. Roll out the marzipan thinly and place on top of the cake pressing down gently to create a smooth finish and trim the edges. Lightly brush the marzipan with whisky, brandy or boiled water to ensure the icing will stick to the marzipan. Place the thinly rolled icing on top, smoothing gently with a rolling pin to create an even finish and again neatly trim the edges.

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
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Tayside Police Tees Up for The Ryder Cup

Matters Arising

<u>Fete</u>

Letters were sent to 3 main beneficiaries requesting continuing support and representation on organising committee. Church representatives will be Bill Connolly & Janet Little with Rosemary Johnston taking over the role of Treasurer from Sheona Reid and representing the Old Folks will be Stewart Smith and Arthur Jenkins. The Hall committee have not yet replied. Steve Whiting said that he was happy to chair fete meetings but required other(s) to lead as main co-ordinator. He will organise initial meeting. The Community Council welcomed the fact that there were people in place to manage the organisation of the fete and that it didn't have to concern itself further with the future of the event.

Investment Fund

CCllr Ponton updated the meeting on her research into Trim Trail options. Ongoing. CCllr Vaughan (by e mail) reported on Christmas decorations costing and practicalities. Ongoing.

It was agreed that the next GCC meeting decide on next actions.

CCllr Watson reported that she will be meeting with Community Youth Workers to discuss ways in which Glenfarg's young people can be given a voice in this process. Drains, flooding, road sweeping, general street maintenance

Flooding continues to be a problem, particularly at the bottom of Duncrievie Road at its junction with Ladeside/Church Brae. Cllr Giacopazzi gave contact details of P&KC Roads Supervisor. Secretary to liaise. Request to be made to P&KC for schedule and routes of street sweeping and drain/gully clearing as both seem to be spasmodic and frequently carried out only after drains totally blocked and resident(s) alert P&KC.

The area in Duncrievie Road, which was affected by Stephens plant crossing is being addressed by Stephens.

Hedges

The hedges beyond the Stables have now been cut back. Some of the hedges within the village which overhung footpaths have been cut back but others are still giving rise to complaints of lack of height and width clearance. Statutory vertical clearance is 2.4m and advice is being sought on whether full width of pavement/footpath should be unobstructed. The latter is particularly relevant in Glenfarg where pavements can be extremely narrow.

Weeding

A request has been made for weeding of Sundial feature and the path from Wallace Park to Ash Grove.

Dog Fouling

A continuing problem throughout area. Request has been made to P&KC for more frequent emptying of dog waste bins (especially well used bin at top of Wallace Park to Duncrievie path)

Road Markings

CCllr Johnston corrected from last minute that a white line outside the church had been requested. This is specifically for use by elderly/infirm churchgoers, wedding and funeral cars. The white line at the hall, which was not repainted during recent program, will not be required when car park at rear completed.

Police Report

There was no police officer present and no report received. Council unaware of any issues.

Treasurer's Report

CCllr Vaughan reported (by e mail) current balances. GCC current account £8030.49 which includes £467 of unallocated micro grant fund & £6000 former Investment Fund Newsletter £2814.84 School Prize Fund £841

Glenfarg District Nursing Association

CCllr Vaughan has been alerted to the existence of a trust fund that was originally set up in the 1950's to build a house in the village for the District Nurse and then to provide assistance to elderly and infirm residents. As the NHS took over responsibility for the provision of district nursing and providing physical aids, the trust's purpose became redundant. The bank would like to close the account but there are no surviving trustees or signatories. The trust appears to have been wound up at some stage as there is no record of it with OSCR/Charities Commission or HMRC. The bank appears to be amenable to transferring the funds to GCC for us to distribute. Further investigation and discussion at next meeting.

Planning

CCllr Johnston reported on the 6 applications considered, 5 were noted and 1 objection lodged. The objection was lodged against wind turbine at Colliston Farm. Full details can be found on website.

Village Hall application

CCllrs Watson & Johnston met with Village Hall committee chairman to discuss detail of application. There will only be 5 parking spaces including 1 disabled since hall users expressed a desire to maintain a grassed area. The hall committee will maintain landscaping. Access to Scottish Water equipment at Main Street end will remain.

Community Council Role & Responsibilities

CCllr Mackenzie is to attend a meeting at Loch Leven Campus which will examine the report of the Government Short Life Working Group on Community Council Role.

Binn Eco Park

<u>Community Engagement Meeting</u> CCllr Arnold attended and reported that general consensus was that forum was working well and complaints re Binn Farm operations had reduced. Proposed increase in production/storage of wood pellets will result in an extra 8000+ vehicle movements per annum. All movements should be routed via Junction 9 of M90.

(Binn Eco Park)Wind Farm Community Liaison Group CCllrs Armstrong and Arnold attended. Also represented were Abernethy CC, Earn CC and Auchtermuchty & Strathmiglo CC. The proposal is for 4-5 turbines, approx 120m high with planning application expected early 2013. Should this proposal reach fruition there may be a community benefit fund established. Public awareness meetings/exhibitions to be held in Abernethy & Glenfarg.

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
