Village Hall News

Work is shortly to start to improve the land between the hall and Main Street. This area has been neglected for many years and detracts from the hall as an important community asset. The plans for the area include parking for five cars including one space for disabled users; and the creation of a landscaped area for play space and other uses associated with the hall. The work will necessitate the temporary closure of the footpath between Greenbank Road and Main Street. The footpath will be upgraded and a new gateway will be formed to link directly to Glenfarg Green. The construction work is expected to take four to five weeks and will be carried out by the Cupar firm, T and N Gilmartin. Plans can be viewed on the hall noticeboard.

The project has received a great deal of support – both in kind and financially. Financial support has been received from Awards for All (Big Lottery Fund); Glenfarg Community Council; Perth and Kinross Council Community Environment Challenge Fund;



Perth and Kinross Quality of Life Trust; the Scottish Government and the European Community Rural Tayside LEADER programme; the Scottish Community Foundation from the RWE Npower renewables Lochelbank Community Fund; and the Village Hall itself.

Once the work is completed the hall garden will be available to all hall users – especially youth groups and those groups catering for smaller children. The space could also occasionally be used for marquees for weddings or other larger events. The hall committee hope that the garden will not only remove a blight on the village, but will also ease parking congestion on Greenbank Road, enhance the hall facilities and amenity generally, and extend the range of activities that take place in the hall.





Tempting Tiramisu

Ingredients:

200g tub mascarpone Italian cheese 1 tsp quality vanilla essence 300ml strong black coffee 150ml Tia Maria 4 medium egg volks* 75g caster sugar 284ml fresh double cream 200g Savoiardi biscuit finger, or sponge fingers Plus – cocoa powder to dust



Method:

Make the strong black coffee and mix with the Tia Maria, allow to cool in a shallow bowl. Then in a large bowl whisk the egg yolks and sugar until very pale, add the mascarpone cheese and whisk until thoroughly blended. Add the vanilla essence to the mixture and whisk again until mixture is smooth and even. In a separate bowl whisk all the double cream until it stands in soft peaks. Then fold the whipped cream into the mascarpone mixture, and whisk gently to ensure ingredients are thoroughly combined.

Take the Savoiardi/sponge biscuits and dip individually into the coffee mixture and then place in the bottom of a 4pint shallow serving dish. Spread approx half of the mascarpone/cream mixture over the sponges and then repeat with another layer of dipped sponges and a final layer of mascarpone mixture.

Cover with foil or cling film and chill for at least 2 hours.

Dust with cocoa powder immediately before serving.

Delicious!

Bolero Glenfarg Explorer Style



Dear Residents of Glenfarg & Duncrievie

This is an open letter to the village from the Glenfarg and Duncrievie in Bloom Committee (GDIB)

GDIB is an organisation that has existed for 7 years now and hopefully you will agree that vast

improvements have been made to our village. The committee is very small ((only 6 members) and it is impossible for the committee alone to complete all the maintenance necessary. Therefore your suggestions are sought on how to encourage more people to become involved.

Here are some of the tasks which GDIB and friends have done for the village:

- Containers at Marindin, Telephone Box, The Church, Duncrievie South entrance, top of Ash Grove, opposite The Hotel, Shop corner, Earnside wall and The War Memorial
- Hanging baskets along north entrance to the village, at the garage on Main Street and at Duncrievie
- Tattie boxes and containers which line the south entrance to the village and 2 at Duncrievie
- Verge strimming at North and South ends
- Bulb planting along the south verge and at Duncrievie
- Maintenance of the small patch at the North end of the village (called Dupplin because originally the plants came from Dupplin nursery),

Train Stop, The Village Green and Winter Garden, The War Memorial and The School

- Growing on of plug plants (10 families give up their time and greenhouse space to do this)
- Watering of containers in summer,
- Litter picking on various paths in Glenfarg and Duncrievie

The Village Green is a major attraction in the centre of our village but is also a very large area and needs 3 or 4 people to regularly maintain it or perhaps this could be a village day where everyone works together 2 or 3 times a year. Did you know that, at the moment, the only thing the Council does to help maintain it, is to cut the paths and perhaps the meadow grass? (The meadow grass may not be done in future due to Council cuts.) It is up to us as a village to maintain the rest of The Green. Can you do anything to help?

Do you think working as a whole village day is a good idea? Which day and what sort of time of day do you think is most suitable? Everyone nowadays lead very hectic lives and that is why we need to know your personal opinion.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR ALL DRIVERS

IS YOUR DRIVING LICENCE INVALID?

It is estimated that around 2 million UK motorists are driving with an out of date Driving Licence which could result in a fine and render their car insurance invalid.

The problem stems from drivers wrongly believing that the (newish) photo card Driving Licence is valid for life; in fact it must be renewed **every 10 years**.

The first ones were issued in 1998 i.e., **15** years ago.

Can we suggest you have a look at the front of your Driving Licence and see when it is valid from (4a) and when it expires (4b). (You might need a magnifying glass!)



Note: Some drivers still have old paper licences. These are currently valid until the 70th birthday but they are being replaced over the next 2 years by the photocard type.

A Real Winter Warmer Recipe

Cock-a-Leekie Soup

This is a traditional Scottish recipe for which there are many, many versions; some involve the addition of prunes, or celery or barley. This is my favourite and makes a fresh and tasty, meaty soup which was one




of the soups available at the December "Soup and a Chat". In line with the current popularity for simpler recipes, there are few ingredients needed to make this good winter soup. Real chicken stock is essential to

provide the best flavour, as well as some meat for the final pot. Rather than using a whole chicken to prepare the stock, I use chicken thighs which give a good flavour. The amounts given will make a large pot of soup that serves up to eight people; it is fairly easy to scale down the proportions to make less. And there is a bonus because not all of the thighs are needed for the final soup, you have some cooked chicken to spare for another dish.

Ingredients

6 chicken thighs
3 litres water
300g leeks trimmed, sliced
thinly across the stem
240g carrots grated
40g white rice
salt and pepper to taste
1 tablespoon chopped parsley
to garnish




Method

- 1. Simmer the chicken pieces in the water in a large pan for an hour, skimming off any foam that appears. Once cooking is complete, remove the chicken pieces to a sieve and collect any liquid that drains to return to the pan. Reserve two or three thighs for the soup, the others can be kept or discarded as you prefer.
- 2. When the reserved chicken pieces are cool enough to handle, remove the skin and bones before breaking the meat into small pieces. Return the meat pieces to the stock, together with the sliced leeks, grated carrots, rice and salt.
- 3. Bring the stock back to the boil and simmer for 30 minutes until the rice is cooked.
- 4. Check and adjust seasoning, adding salt and not too much pepper. Serve with a garnish of finely chopped parsley.



Glenfarg Observatory & Telescope

(The following was received by email from the Antique Telescope Society in New York and I hope that we are able to assist them in tracking down the whereabouts and history of this unique telescope.)

Dear Glenfarg residents, Happy Holidays!

I am tracing the history of what was, in its day, the largest refracting telescope in Scotland. The lens was made by the celebrated Andrew Ross of London, 11.5" diameter, and mounted by Ransome and May. It was shown in the Great Exhibition in Hyde Park, 1851, and then sold to the Eighth Earl of Elchies, Mr. J. W. Grant. He built a substantial observatory at his manor in Wester Elchies and the telescope was used by him briefly and by the celebrated astronomer, Piazzi-Smyth, also briefly. But Grant died in 1865. Grant sold the telescope not long before he died, in 1864, to a Mr. Tod, owner of Ayton House, Glenfarg. Mr. Tod acquired the estate ca. 1860, and died in 1867. Apparently Tod didn't get much use out of this great telescope either. Mrs. Tod remarried in 1870. After she died, in 1904 there was a court case in which her second husband, Mr. Finlay, was stopped by the heir(s), at least temporarily, before selling the observatory and telescope among other items. After that I know little. I understand that today the observatory is no longer existing, but it was substantial:


"...a handsome circular stone building covered with a moveable dome and built at the eastern extremity of a strip of ground in a field situated at a distance of about 150 yards in a direct line from the mansion house The telescope is placed in

the centre of the building and rests on a solid foundation of masonry 10 feet in diameter and 4 feet deep on which a cast metal baseplate and pedestal weighing about five tons bedded solid in cement This base plate is 9 feet in diameter and 12 inches deep terminating in a pedestal about 3 feet high all cast in one piece upon which rests an iron pillar 7 feet high which is attached to it with bolts The cast metal base is not secured to the masonry with bolts but the great diameter and weight of the base renders these unnecessary the whole being constructed in substantial and permanent manner." 1904 is where my cyberspace trail ends. I am hoping that there is a local historical society or community historian that may have further information about the disposition of the telescope. Was it sold? And if so, to whom and when? Or was it simply dismantled, having languished for 37 years after Mr. Tod died?

Our November book was 'A week in December' by Sebastian Faulks

"It's London, the week before Christmas, 2007. Over seven days we follow the lives of seven major characters: a hedge fund manager trying to bring off the biggest trade of his career; a professional footballer recently arrived from Poland; a young lawyer with little work and too much time to speculate; a student who has been led astray by Islamist theory; a hack book-reviewer; a schoolboy hooked on skunk and reality TV; and a Tube train driver whose Circle Line train joins these and countless other lives together in a daily loop. The novel pieces together the complex patterns and crossings of modern urban life. Greed, the dehumanising effects of the electronic age and the fragmentation of society are some of the themes dealt with in this savagely humorous book. The writing on the wall appears in letters ten feet high, but the characters refuse to see it — and party on as though tomorrow is a dream.

Sebastian Faulks probes not only the self-deceptions of this intensely realised group of people, but their hopes and loves as well. As the novel moves to its gripping climax, they are forced, one by one, to confront the true nature of the world they inhabit."

We all enjoyed the characterisation and feeling of reality with this novel and scored it a resounding 8.6/10.

Moving on to our December read, we tried 'Troubles' by J.G. Farrell – winner of the Lost Man Booker Prize.

"Set in Kilnalough, Ireland, in 1921, in a dilapidated hotel among a motley cast of the equally dilapidated Anglo-Irish upper class, Troubles stars Major Brendan Archer, a veteran of the first World War and fiancé of the elusive Angela Spencer, daughter of the proprietor of the Majestic Hotel, Edward Spencer. The Majestic's name has taken on the quality of bitter irony as the hotel is literally falling to pieces around its owners and residents, a group of elderly ladies left stranded by their own declining fortunes. The Major (as is known throughout the book) arrives to find nothing as he expected. Angela is mysteriously ill, Edward is slowly going mad and the Major finds himself falling hard for caustic Sarah Devlin, who is, of all things, a Catholic.

The Major stays at the hotel for a time, goes away, comes back, and goes away again. Edward becomes increasingly paranoid about the social and political deterioration of British rule in Ireland, and about Sinn Fein (the "Shinners") aggression, and the threat moves closer to home when his son marries a Catholic and runs away. The narrative is punctuated with news items about the state of British rule in Ireland, India and elsewhere in the Empire to underline the sense of instability.



Meanwhile, a colony of feral cats slowly takes over and the building continues to fall apart.

But don't think Troubles is just some grim, depressing book. Farrell's writing is razor-sharp and funny and noteperfect; if you like black humour, Troubles is the book for you."

This book met with a wide variety of comments, likes and dislikes – it was one of those love it or loathe it reads and our average group score reflected the diversity of opinion scoring it a lowly 5.2/10.
