

Our thoughts are with her husband David and all their family.


Marette will be sadly missed in the village, but she will never be forgotten and will be remembered by everyone who had the pleasure of knowing and meeting her.

Dear Friends,

Yes, I am still here as Locum Minister of Abernethy and Dron and Glenfarg; probably by the time you read this letter I will have been Locum Minister for a year, and the congregation will still be looking for a permanent minister to take them forward.

These days there are few people who feel called to train for the Ministry of Word and Sacrament. The reasons for this situation are numerous: we are living in an increasingly secular society; the pool from which to draw recruits is shrinking as congregations shrink; pressure from the peer group is strong etc. As this century unfolds, congregations will need to live by sharing ministers more widely, and by doing more for themselves. I see no alternative.

However, I am not downhearted. I know the parish church still has an important role to play. It will always be a place of welcome at any time. It will always be a place where people can go when others will not listen to them or tolerate them. It will always be the place where we can be ourselves in the presence of a power beyond our understanding. It will always be the place where we will be challenged to open our minds to new possibilities in life. It will always be the place which reminds us that rich and poor are as one in the eyes of God. It will always be the place where we are reminded that everyone needs a second chance in life. It will always be the place where we can mark the main personal and national events in life. It will always be the place to go when we are hurting. But these things need to be experienced by a wider community.

Here in Arngask we, along with our friends in Abernethy and Dron, have set up a "Think Tank" to brainstorm ideas for the development of the church in the community. No matter how many ideas we may have there will always be more and probably better ones. If you have the time and the inclination to do so, would you please pass on any ideas you may have. Meantime, let's enjoy this Spring in all its beauty and with its promises of warmer Summer days.

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FIRE SAFETY IN THE HOME

In 2011/2012 there were over 32,000 fires in Scotland. Of these, over 5,000 were in homes in which 51 people died and over 1,200 people were injured. In many cases the house or flat was destroyed or badly damaged and treasured possessions lost. With this in mind, here are some tips from the Scottish Fire & Rescue Service to help you make your home safer from fire:

- Fit a smoke alarm on every level i.e., upstairs and downstairs.
- Test the alarm/s once a week. Replace the batteries periodically.
- Plan an escape route and make sure everybody knows how to get out if there's a fire.
- Stub cigarettes out properly and dispose of them carefully.
- Do not leave young children alone in the kitchen when cooking and keep matches and saucepan handles out of their reach.
- Take care when cooking with hot oil especially if you have been drinking alcohol.
- Ensure candles are secured in a proper holder and keep them away from curtains and other fabrics.
- Do not overload electrical sockets try to keep to one plug per socket.
- If you have an open fire use a fireguard.

The Scottish Fire & Rescue Service will carry out a **FREE** fire safety check of your home and install smoke alarms (if required).

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Recipe

Sticky Sausages

I find these Sticky Sausages are always a big hit when accompanying pre dinner drinks, and make a nice change from the usual canopies!

The quantities can be changed quite easily to accommodate the number of guests, and I would budget for around 4 or 5 sausages per person. Yes, they are very popular!! The quantities here are sufficient for 6 people:

24 good quality short pork cocktail sausages - chipolatas are ideal 5 tablespoons hoisin sauce 6 tablespoons runny honey 1 dessert spoon white mustard seeds Cocktail sticks to serve



Toss all the above ingredients together in a roasting tin, including the seeds, and cook in a preheated oven at 180' for about 30 minutes


Stir occasionally to allow them to brown all over and prevent sticking. Serve warm....

A Taste of Glenfarg

Gordon and I recently experienced the joys of chef Mark's foray into the realms of 'tasting menus' at the Glenfarg Hotel, the concept as some of you may know, being a number of courses of smaller portions of 'high end' refined cuisine.



We had a couple of friends from Stirling over for dinner on a Friday night in February and asked Mark a few days beforehand if he would be happy to prepare something along the 'tasting menu' lines for the four of us. He came up with a menu that instantly appealed to us and we were happy to go with his selection for each course. First up

was the 'Tian of Avocado, Egg, Tiger Prawn and Pan Fried Scallops' - a variety of really fresh flavours and a wonderful opening to the meal, and so beautifully presented, a picture on a plate. Next up was the 'Risotto of Red Wine, Parmesan and Pancetta'. We weren't sure initially about the idea of red wine in a risotto but it added a gorgeous warm burgundy colour to the rice and a lovely rounded flavour which was an excellent background to the rich, strong pancetta, and the salty moreish parmesan, without any of the ingredients feeling heavy or one overpowering the other.

Next up was a classic of the Glenfarg Hotel that's been popular for some time, but with a new twist, 'Pan Fried Gressingham Duck on

Chinese Greens with a Sweet Potato and Mango Mash'. The Duck was succulent and the sauce heavenly, tangy and a perfect companion to the duck. By this stage of the meal all four of us were well impressed with the standard of the food and wondering why people would venture to Edinburgh for, in some cases, over-inflated prices, and over-rated and over-hyped 'celebrity' restaurants, when we have the makings of such excellent fine dining on our doorstep. Mark was very attentive and popped through now and again to get our feedback. You could sense his enthusiasm for providing dishes of this calibre, and his delight at our reactions.

To finish we had an Anton Mossimaninspired dessert of 'Apricot and Praline Parfait' with a Passion Fruit Coulis and a Pony of Californian Muscat'. This was decorated with an intricate piece of sugar work, and each element went so well with the others, it was a joy filling up your spoon with a bit of everything and washing it down with the dessert wine, an excellent match.



All in all a fantastic meal, and we look forward to hearing about some dates for the diary when Mark starts rolling out a regular 'tasting menu' event.



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
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Suspicious death in the Farg

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Glenfarg Explorer Winter Activities

Winter Hillwalking

The explorers were treated to the best a Scottish Winter can offer when they joined up with some Fife explorers and winter mountain leaders to tackle the Tarmachan ridge. Admittedly the meeting time of 7am is not a time when teenagers are known to be active but it was well worth the effort.

The summits of the munros were clear as we drove up to the car park near the old Lawers' visitors centre. Even with the flat light, the snow covered hills were enticing. Before leaving the car park the explorers were fitted for crampons and once armed with an ice axe they eagerly headed up the track.

Once the first suitable slope had been reached, the party was given instructions on how to use their ice axe should they fall. They learnt how to use the ice axe to stop themselves sliding down the slope if they were on their backs going feet first. Craig discovered what happens when you aren't attached to the ice axe – it stays in the snow and you continue to slide down the slope. Confidence gained they learnt how to control and stop a head first descent.

Crampons were then attached to boots and the party continued over the frozen snow towards the summit. The short steep ascent to the summit using a line of old footprints Niall described as "awesome". Three explorers were

invested on the summit. Despite being under the cloud we could see the sun on the hills to the west, Ben Cruachan above Loch Awe was clear.

The explorers continued round



the ridge to the second top where the sun came out and they posed for pictures with the main summit in the background. With Ben Nevis now visible in the north west, it was like a day in the alps.

Between the second and third tops there is a "bad step". We perched on the side of the hill warmed by the sunshine as each member of the party made their way down. You had to face into the hill and climb down using the frozen footsteps as both foot and handholds and the ice axe for extra protection. The



ecstatic explorers waited for the additional adults in the party to meet them in the coll before the last top. The offer of missing the top out was treated with scorn.

Descending from the last coll down to the snow covered landrover

track was hot in the full sun even though the actual temperature was not much above freezing. Crampons were finally removed on the landrover track, the risk of tired explorer scouts tripping and puncturing themselves with a spike now exceed the risk of injury from falling. The group is looking forward to the next winter walk at the end of March, the leaders aware that repeating the superb conditions is unlikely.

February Skiing

The lift information board said the weather would test the quality of our merino wool clothing. The cloud was blowing across the car park and the wind was whipping the spindrift across the area at head height. Undeterred the explorers headed off to ski hire to collect their equipment.

Some brave individuals headed out for a final half hour, they were lucky with a break in the cloud enabling them to see the whole run. 
For the kids, we have the hugely popular Mr Giggles/Pirate Pete featuring in his Sunday afternoon show.



More hot air from Old Foggie

At the beginning of March we had some fine weather with spring-like temperatures. Warmth from sunshine feels good after days of frost and cloud.

It seems strange to think that the air around us is warmed from the ground and not directly by the sun. Especially when you can feel the heat of the sun on your skin. But the energy from the sun is actually absorbed in the upper layers of the soil and re-radiated back into the atmosphere as heat.

Now as the air near the ground heats up, it begins to rise. As nature abhors a vacuum, cooler air falls to replace it. The movement of warm and cool air reaches a peak just after noon and tails off as the sun descends from it's zenith.



With sophisticated sensors, meteorologists can measure moment to moment changes in the vertical wind speed as eddies distribute warm and cool air throughout the lower atmosphere.

If it's not too windy, results from a basic weather station can give an insight into this turbulent mixing of air. The chart shows the air

temperature and wind speed for the 2nd to the 4th of March. Notice how the air temperature begins to rise around eight o'clock, reaching a peak in the early afternoon.

The increase in temperature reflects the increase in air movement as packets of warmed air rise higher and faster making way for descending cooler air. And as this activity reaches a maximum, wind speed increases. Although the standard wind gauge is built to record horizontal wind speed, rather than vertical, there is sufficient turbulence in the atmosphere to spin the gauge as the temperature peaks. Through the evening, the temperature falls and the wind speed drops off as motion in the air decreases.

So although you can't see it, there's a lot going on around us when the sun's out.

14th May



- Dog Fouling CCllr Arnold reported on meeting with Dog Warden and acquisition of new signs which have been installed throughout area.
- 2. Road Sweeping Secretary reported that she had been advised by P&KC that Glenfarg area was scheduled for fortnightly road sweeping (usually a Tuesday) Pavement sweeping with motor brush every 2-3 months.
- 3. Drains Drains are cleared annually other than on special call out. Cllr Giacopazzi is to pursue a survey of Hayfield Road, junction area of Duncrievie Road/Church Brae/Ladeside and Greenbank Road from War Memorial.
- 4. Hedges Secretary reported that there is no formal width requirements for hedges. However with the exception of some in Birch Lane all problem hedges have been dealt with by the property owners. "There needs to be a 2.4 metres vertical clearance above the surface of the footway" (P&KC website)
- 5. Cable exposed at entrance to Stephen's site (Duncrievie Road nr. Wallace Park) Developer had covered cable but recent rainfall has again exposed cable. A second cable is also now exposed. Secretary to pursue with developer.
- 6. Binn Eco Farm Exhibition held in Glenfarg Village Hall
- 7. Footpath Hilton of Duncrievie meeting of G Lawrie (TRACKS) and landowners to take place.
- 8. Parking at Ladeside/Main St Junction police observation ongoing

Police Report

Previous report received for January meeting (postponed) reported 2 thefts for period and PC Pentley reported on apprehension and charging of vandals (Lion feature). Foundation Scotland

Tom Black of Foundation Scotland was invited to attend GCC meeting to give guidance on best use of CBF funds, in particular the possibility of seeking independent consultation and public survey. Discussion followed on grant upper limits, GCC awareness of applications need for longer term planning. Tom Black will verify if funds can be accessed in advance in the event of a big project.

It was agreed that a public meeting be held to ensure all of the community are aware of processes and that opportunities for community are not lost.

Community Benefit Fund (CBF)

At present the upper limit for grants is £2000 and £500 each to GCC and Earn CC for microgrant allocation. CCllr Vaughan proposed that a request for these amounts to be increased to £5000 and £1000 respectively be put to Earn CC, Lochelbank CBF Panel and Foundation Scotland for agreement. Seconded by CCllr Ponton.

Treasurer's Report

GCC account £13,601.28 of which £6000 has been designated for Christmas lights and £6011 Glenfarg District Nursing Association (agenda item May meeting) is restricted. £286 microgrant funds available.

Newsletter account - £3,825.98. Shop donations and renewed annual subscriptions generating £480. At 4th March 20 of the 37 advertiser invoices had been paid. Printer has advised increase in future print costs but still reasonable and fully accepted.
