If you are travelling to Europe this summer you should carry a European Health Insurance Card (EHIC). This card entitles you to free or reduced-cost medical treatment in many European countries.

The card is free and can be obtained:

- 1. Online at www.ehic.org.uk
- 2. By phone on 0300 330 1350.

Please note:

- 3 million EHICs will expire in 2013 – if you already have one, check it is still in date (they are only valid for 5 years).
- The card is free. Make sure you log on to the official EHIC website as there are many shyster sites charging £15-£20 for the card – do not get caught out.
- 3. Separate cards are required for each family member.
- 4. The card entitles you to basic treatment only it is not a substitute for travel insurance.
- 5. There have been recent reports of the EHIC being refused in parts of Spain and Greece with hospitals insisting that patients pay for private treatment – this is a breach of EU law so be wary what you are asked to sign.

## **Glenfarg Store-y Book Club**

The Glenfarg Store-y Book Club has read 2 books since the last Newsletter, the first being **Stonemouth by Iain Banks** 

Stonemouth is a town north of Aberdeen with a long sandy beach and a bridge and is beautiful when the sun shines, which is a rare event in this novel. The story opens with Stewart Gilmour returning to his hometown for the funeral of a gangster, five years after he was run out of town by the deceased's family for committing an as yet unknown crime. The story unfolds in real time and in flashback and the uneasy truce between Stewart and the town's biggest crime family, the Murstons, becomes even more strained. Stewart feels he has moved on with his life and is disconnected from his friends who have stayed behind in Stonemouth, doing the same things, drinking in the same pubs with the same people as he did five years before. This is also a love story. Stewart was in love with Elle Murston and may still be, but this could prove fatal! The group didn't really enjoy this novel, some thought that lain Banks was trying too hard to be "cool and trendy" with mentions of iphones and other gadgets. Others felt the plot moved too slowly and the ending was preposterous. We haven't awarded it marks out of ten because hardly anyone finished it.



### Our second was The Redemption of Alexander Seaton by Shona MacLean

A thriller? A murder mystery? A historical novel? This book is all of these. This is a gripping tale set in Banff in the 1620s. Alexander Seaton is our main character, a, disgraced minister turned school teacher living a dissolute life. When his friend is accused of the murder of the apothecary's apprentice he vows to prove his innocence . Set against a background of witchcraft, superstition,spies and a possible Catholic threat from Spain this novel gathers pace to a very satisfactory conclusion. The group felt the author described the setting and the time period well enough that we could conjure up a picture of

them. We did feel a map of the area between Banff and Aberdeen would have been useful as would a list of the characters and perhaps an explanation of some of their job titles, Baillie, Provost, Session Clerk to mention a few. The group awarded this book 7.5 out of 10. It certainly gave us plenty to talk about.

### The weather's not all up there

Distance from the ground makes a big difference to how the weather is perceived. Lie down in heather while winds are blowing over the moor and you will be surprised at the degree of stillness. Beetles at two centimetres tall in summer grass will experience similar weather conditions to a human at two metres tall in woodland. Even one hundred millimetres of snow cover can make a ten degree difference between the surface of the snow and the soil below.

The graph shows temperatures at fifty centimetres and three metres above ground level. These were recorded in Glenfarg on the seventh of May; our only summer day this year. (Ed. - "At time of writing, you should say, Old Foggie").



In the still air of early morning, the temperature at both levels rises at about one degree every twenty minutes. As the morning progresses, the warm air at the three metre level mixes with cooler air above and the rate of increase in temperature drops to one degree every ninety minutes, peaking at a pleasant nineteen degrees.

Not so at the sheltered lower level. At fifty centimetres the temperature continues to rise. Round about eleven o'clock in the morning its climbing at one degree every ten minutes and peaks at a steamy twenty five degrees. Now we are reaching stress levels for both plants and insects.

In the evening, with no energy input from the sun, the ground cools more quickly than the air above. The temperature gradient reverses now with the air nearer the ground being about two degrees cooler than at the three metre level.

So please remember. The next time you see someone lying down on the grass apparently asleep, don't disturb them. As they are actually carrying out vital meteorological research.

This is just the beginning of what promises to be an educational, entertaining and worthwhile recording of Glenfarg's recent social history.

The cover photo of this Newsletter is one I had not previously seen despite collecting Glenfarg Postcards over the past 30 years, and Cath Fairweather was good enough to give me some detail "*The photo was* probably taken a few yards from the main road and shows the entrance which is just about where the road crosses the River Farg (almost across from the main road entry to the Village Hall). It shows the Station Master's house with the adjoining waiting room /ticket office. The trees on the right hand side of the picture behind the house are on Arngask road. Also on the right hand side there is a gate which I am sure lead to the garden." Thanks for that Cath.

I will, with your help, continue to record all such snippets and memories and with Robin and Janet's help there will be a product we can all enjoy for years to come. Please keep sending me material.

Introduction by the Chair was followed by Tom Black's outline of the role of Foundation Scotland in developing good practices in fund development. The Foundation also trains panel members and offers community support and consultation. When requests for funding are submitted to Foundation Scotland they contact each applicant to ensure the guidelines for awards are being met. The Foundation makes agreed payments and monitors the progress of the projects, feeding back to the Panel and communities the outcome of the awards.

The Lochelbank Fund provides £20,000 per annum for the Panel to distribute between Glenfarg and Bridge of Earn Communities. The Panel consists of 2 members from each community elected by residents and 2 nominated CC members, 1 from each CC.

At present, the fund pays £500 per annum to each Community to distribute in the form of Micro Grants which are available when needed. The balance of the Fund is distributed following meetings of the 6 panel members, which are held 3 times annually.

The purpose of the meeting was to ensure that our whole Community is aware of the fund and work of the Panel and to establish a system whereby awards are made with the knowledge and support of the people as a whole. A detailed discussion took place with a variety of views being aired. The feeling of the meeting was that a 'legacy' of the fund was something that is desirable in some format. With this in mind, it was decided that a village profile should be produced to allow a clearer picture of the needs of our Community. Knowledge of similar schemes in local areas and a document already in the Village following the shop project should be investigated. Cedric Wilkins, Colin Campbell amongst others showed willingness to drive this forward and report back at a further meeting within 6 months. The meeting will be called following the production and circulation of this document and before large projects should be considered.

The current Panel members agreed to make public – via the noticeboard and website – any application received by Foundation Scotland that are due to be discussed. Members of the Village can read and comment on these to assist the Panel members in gauging the level of support for each possible award.

The meeting closed at 9.30pm with thanks to the Panel and Chair.
