

announce the birth of their 12th grandchild in June when Aileen and Rory had Ronan, a brother for Daniel, Maria and Alannah.



How did they get there?

Have you ever wondered how three curling stones ended up in the wall on Main Street?



Many of our older residents will remember George (or Dod as most knew him) Brunton who was the milkman in Glenfarg from 1947 until the 1960's. Dod always said "I'll leave my mark on Glenfarg one day" and that is exactly what he did.

When the Glenfarg Curling Pond was closed Dod took the opportunity to recover some of the discarded stones from the bottom of the pond. When he ran out of folk who wanted them for doorstops etc., he added the last three to the pile of stones being used for the new wall along Main Street at the time when the motorway was built.


But no! There's a twist – it turns out that . . .

Country Dancing

Country Dancing is a splendid way to enjoy meeting people, to stimulate the brain, and to take exercise; and all this at the same time.



It has influenced the way British people have thought for about 600 years, and the peak of Country Dancing was the period known as "The Enlightenment", which suggests that its effect on our brains may have been quite significant.

It is a social activity that all ages can enjoy together, and is an important part of our culture. I am hoping to start Country Dancing here at Bountree on Friday nights, starting in October. All ages and abilities are welcome — it is a social activity, not a competition! All aspects of Country Dancing will be included (Scottish, English and Historical), with also a look at some of the dances from which it developed. Have a look at the Village Shop window for details.

Listed below are 21 good reasons for taking up this form of dance.

- 1. Primarily a social activity, so increases co-operative thinking and social skills
- 2. All benefits of both physical and mental exercise, but NOT using excessive stresses.
- 3. Increases spatial awareness
- 4. Uses simple logical patterns, strengthening the relevant brain pathways, including Left/Right awareness and symmetry concepts
- 5. Requires concentration to be maintained, at varying levels, for the whole of the dance

- 6. Involves interaction with other human beings, including smiling at them which releases mood-enhancing endorphins, so it is 2x as successful as pills for treating depression.(Prof Michael Argyll.)
- 7. Uses social behaviour in a moderately formal setting
- 8. Highly inclusive, but allows individuality
- 9. The "Best" dancer is the most helpful, NOT the most technically excellent, but --
- 10. Scope for responding to challenges of technique.
- 11. Historical aspects give increased awareness of past ages.
- 12. Includes "trust" exercises
- 13. Can be enjoyed at any level
- 14. Can lead to study of 18thC style, and so great elegance.
- 15. 600 years of heritage, peaking with enlightenment period –facts possibly connected.
- 16. Stresses cooperation and helpfulness, which balances competitiveness of sport
- 17. Is your intangible inheritance, because it works on your brain and influences the way you think, so the next reason is no surprise –
- 18. Recent research shows improved performance in Schools after introducing Country Dancing
- 19. It is usually inexpensive, and available worldwide
- 20. Good for bone development and maintenance
- 21. It is very enjoyable the primary reason.

Explorer Scouts Tour de France

The challenge set by the explorers for their summer camp. We want a cycle camp. We want to go abroad. The budget is £250 a head.

There were three Sunday cycles before the big event. On the first, one of the boys learnt not to cycle into gates. On the second another one learnt how to brake, pulling on the front brake and you go over the handlebars. On the third they learnt to leave a gap between each other on tracks then you can avoid the person who has just fallen off.

Robert left on the Friday night towing the trailer with 10 bikes and the camping gear to drive to Calais via Dover. The navigator was unable to tow as he had passed his driving test after 1997.

Eight explorers and the remaining leader met at Inverkeithing station at 07:30 to catch the train to Dover via London. The journey to London passed quickly planning their Duke of Edinburgh expedition and playing cards.

Robert met the ferry and took 4 of the group back to the site to pitch tents while the rest walked the 3 miles to the campsite. Cameron managed to swap his neckie for a French one before we had got half way and then the sky was lit by lightning. Robert came back and rescued us and we huddled in the pitched tent until the storm passed. Tents pitched we all headed to bed, and then the fireworks display started on the beach at Bleriot Plage to the James Bond film music. Those who got out their beds were very impressed.

Sunday morning the bikes were unloaded and checked before Niall led the group through the back streets of Calais at the start of the 80km cycle to Montrieul. Christine headed towards the shops with Gavin as navigator (he had broken his thumb and couldn't cycle). Within 15 minutes there were three punctures, not a good start.



Mid afternoon the explorers had drunk all their water and the back up team struggled to find a shop open on a Sunday afternoon in very rural France. Ali, who had been invalided out and was in the car spotted an open tabac in a tiny hamlet where we bought the cheapest ice cold bottled water ever.

Montreuil, the town that gave Victor Hugo the inspiration for Les Miserables was our destination for the night. Again we had to wait until the

thunderstorm passed before we finished pitching the tents in the campsite below the ancient citadel where a performance of Les Miserables started when it got dark and finished with a firework display.

We continued our journey south to the Baie de Somme feasting on cherries fresh from the trees at the Abbaye de Valloire and stopping briefly at the site of the battle of Cercy (the museum was shut for the day). Arriving at the campsite at Ponthoille we had managed to pitch a couple of tents before, for the third day running, we had to shelter from the thunderstorm. Beside our pitch was a free crazy golf course which provided hours of entertainment.



Tuesday was damp and grey, the only day of the trip when the sun didn't shine. We followed the cycle route to St Vallery sur Somme, the local town. Struan discovered that crossing the railway track on a bike can be lethal and the resulting slide was consistent.



The kind folk of Glenfarg and Duncrievie are being asked to help people less advantaged than themselves.

As of the end of September, the Village Shop and the church will see regular collections to help people living in food poverty.

In conjunction with The Trussell Trust and churches in the area, the newly established Perth and Kinross Food Bank will see collection points throughout the region.

Now the onus is on the public to donate tins, packets and boxes from a select shopping list to help out people in crisis with shoppers being asked to buy an extra item for the charity. And the local church is getting involved with donations to the annual Harvest Festival also going to the food bank.

How it works is quite simple. Donations to the food bank will be collected in The Village Shop and the church, from where it will go to a new warehouse in Perth. There, volunteers weigh and sort the donated food according to type and 'best before date'. They also check it is undamaged and suitable for use before packing it into boxes for storage.

Meanwhile, professionals from statutory and voluntary organisations such as doctors, health visitors, social workers, Citizens Advice Bureau staff, welfare officers, the police and probation officers, identify people in crisis and issue them with a foodbank youcher.

Clients bring their voucher to the centre where it can be exchanged for three days' supply of emergency food. The list of foods in each parcel have been designed by dieticians to provide recipients with nutritionally balanced food.

Whilst their food is being packed, Foodbank volunteers will sit and chat with clients over a cup of tea or hot meal. This enables them to hear their stories and signpost them to agencies who can offer additional help and begin to resolve any underlying problems.

The new centre in Perth was expected to open at the end of September and a box for donations has already been placed in the shop and at the church, with collections being ongoing. Unfortunately fresh items cannot be donated, but the list includes: UHT or powdered milk, sugar in 500g bags, cartons of long-life fruit juice, soup, pasta sauces, tinned sponge puddings, tinned fruit and vegetables, cereals, tea and coffee, instant mashed potato, rice and pasta, tinned meat and fish, jam, biscuits and cereal bars.

Amid the economic recession, more and more people are turning to food banks – in the year 2012/13, The Trussell Trust fed over 340,000 with estimates putting the number of people living below the poverty line at three million.



Old Foggie turns to dust

Have you ever noticed how a well polished car is covered in a fine layer of dust after rain. Some may be local wind blown material such as pollen or soil dust. But the finer dust comes with the rain and is actually what the rain drops form around. These particle vary in size from submicroscopic up to about 50 microns (1 micron is equal to 1/1000 millimetre).

When water vapour in the atmosphere rises, it cools and begins to condense But it needs a surface on which to form a water droplet; surfaces such as those of a salt crystal or dust particle. Droplets of similar size will coalesce as they fall, forming rain drops. The quantity of particulate matter in the atmosphere never varies by a great amount, with new material rising on warm air currents while old material is washed out by the rain. The only exceptions are after major volcanic eruptions or forest fires.

Dust samples from Glenfarg had low counts when the weather was warm and high counts after prolonged rainfall. This is what would be expected with warm air causing the dust to rise and the rain washing out the dust onto any exposed surface. The photograph shows a typical sample from the end of June. Although something very non-dust like has been trapped amongst the expected bits!



Don't fall for application form scams online

Perth & Kinross Trading Standards is warning people not to fall for excess charges when applying for official documents.

If you require a passport, driving licence, EHIC Health card or Esta application, or are booking your driving test or theory test, beware of websites which look like they are taking a fee for the full cost of processing and submitting the application.

These sites, often mistaken for the official sites, charge a fee to have your application checked or a booking fee for your driving test.

As these copycat and unofficial websites look a lot like the genuine sites, people are being misled.

Many people have mistakenly paid for this checking service, with some companies charging up to £45 per enquiry. Any official application fee will then also be payable on top of this, so this scam can double the cost of applying for these documents.

Although these sites are not necessarily illegal they can lead the unwary into paying unnecessary fees.

The European Health Insurance Card (previously the E111) entitles UK residents to the same level of national healthcare as nationals in European Union countries and although it provides valuable medical cover, it is not a replacement to travel insurance. You can apply for this card free of charge via the official EHIC online application form.

Electronic System for Travel Authorization (Esta) is the authorisation required for people who wish to travel to the United States under the Visa Waiver Program, there is a charge for this authorisation. Apply online at https://esta.cbp.dhs.gov/esta/

It is not a requirement to have your passport application checked but for peace of mind the Post Office offers this service at a lower price and they will deliver your form securely to the Passport Office. These application forms can be picked up at your local Post Office branch or online at www.postoffice.co.uk/passport-check-send.

When using these copycat and unofficial websites you are giving them a large amount of your personal information, more than enough for identity fraud to be possible.

Complete your electoral registration form

Angus and Perth & Kinross residents will shortly receive their annual electoral registration form through the post and are being encouraged to complete and return it promptly.

Included with this form will be a Young Person's Registration form to allow 15 year olds who will reach 16 years of age, on or before 18 September 2014, to register to vote at next year's Scottish Independence Referendum.

Electors do not have to return the Young Person's Registration form if there is no-one within your household who meets the criteria to be included on the form.

Electoral registration staff are working closely with schools, colleges and all other educational establishments in both areas to gather data on all 15 to 18 year olds for the 2014 referendum.

Alastair Kirkwood, Electoral Registration Officer for Angus and Perth & Kinross, said "Registering to vote is quick and simple. All you have to do is update your electoral registration forms with details of everyone who lives in the household and is eligible to vote; and return to us as soon as possible in the pre-paid envelope.

If your details haven't changed you can simply reply by telephone, internet or text message instead.

This is the last annual canvass before the European Parliament election on 22 May 2014 and the Scottish Independence Referendum on 18 September 2014 therefore you should return your forms to ensure you are eligible to vote.

Anyone who has not received a form by 7 October, or who would like more information, should contact the local electoral registration office."

Previous Minutes

The minutes of last meeting were proposed by CCllr Ponton and seconded by CCllr Watson

Matters arising

- 1.Road markings roundels now completed
- Avenue flooding Fordel owner has cleared blockage and hopefully resolved problem.
- 3.Stephens development public meeting has taken place- main cause for concern expressed related to access to Main Road. New diagrams showing new footpath connections to the park not yet on P&KC website. Neighbouring property resident has alerted developer to water course diversion which affects neighbouring septic tanks.
- 4.Trees by Tennis Courts Tennis Club has replied to GCC and reported that they had consulted P&KC tree officer and been authorised to remove bottom third of branches.
- Old Arngask Churchyard Land owner and access details have been sent to Friends of P&K Heritage Trust

Nursing Association Fund

The Council agreed that the fund should be used for health and well being related items/services. Options could include fitness equipment, Kinross Day Centre assistance, Kinross-shire Volunteer Group (KVG) & Rural Outreach Scheme, who provide transport facilities for hospital appointments, etc., and

other such groups. Secretary will contact local Health Centres and Old Folks Association.

Police Report

There have been thefts of trailers outwith the area and suspects have been apprehended. Speed checks have resulted in 3 drivers being warned. Community Officer Allan reminded everyone that fixed penalty notices have increased. CCllr Armstrong reported that large straw bales had fallen from vehicle on Church Brae that morning (2nd Sept). Enquiries continuing.

Planning Report

5 applications since last meeting - all noted Application for 3 turbines at Tillyrie refused The GCC are in receipt today (2nd Sept) of request for public input to draft Local Plan Supplementary Guidelines. Details can be found on P&KC website

No new communication on Lomond Hotel has been received. Concerns were expressed by all present on potential dangers. All present Councillors agreed to write to P&KC seeking urgent action.

Tennis Club Planned New Pavilion

Alex Swanson of Glenfarg Tennis Club gave a presentation on the planned new pavilion and requested a letter of support from GCC on behalf of community for their funding applications. Neighbours have been consulted and the facilities would be made available for other community groups to use. The Tennis Club has been in communication with Stephens re assistance with water supply and sewage. There is provision in plans for possible village storage to be added. Draft letter of support to be prepared.

Glenfarg Conversation Survey

CCIIr Ponton reported that the Lochelbank CBF panel had agreed that the micro grant amount to each Community Council be increased to £1000. The limit for applications to main fund remains at £2000.

The Conversation Survey is ready to go to print. There will be a household delivery and also opportunity to complete on website. It was agreed to make a donation from Newsletter fund to the Scouts who, it is understood, have agreed to make a door-to-door delivery of the survey forms.

Fete Proceeds

GCC received 5 applications for share of Fete Proceeds. they were Brownies & Rainbows - £144 - attendance at Big Brownie Party BUD (Brighten up Duncrievie) - £95 - purchase of compost, bulbs, liquid feed Glenfarg & Duncrievie in Bloom - £300 - hire local contractor to cut grass verges

Cinema - £75 - hire of equipment

Baby & Toddlers - £150 - purchase assorted craft materials and equipment

All applications were approved and the shortfall in funds available of £44 will be made up from Newsletter Fund.

Future of marquee

Following the successful borrowing of items for the Fete from KLEO (Kinross-shire Local Events Organisation) and the subsequent lending of the Glenfarg marquee to KLEO, it was agreed that the secretary offer the marquee to KLEO to add to their facilities. If it is accepted by KLEO it is understood that they will provide storage and insurance cover and, in return, Glenfarg would have prior call on the marquee when required for village functions as well as being able to borrow other KLEO items free of charge.

First World War Commemorations

CCIIr Johnston reported on activities and funding opportunities relating to WW1 commemoration projects. There is a church record of some people who went to serve from Glenfarg. The Head Teacher of Arngask Primary has been approached with a view to the school carrying out some research of their names and connections with Arngask. She expressed initial interest in this.

Correspondence and AOCB

- 1.Cllr Barnacle has requested details of areas where additional grass verge cutting is required. Advised Mawcarse Junction, Calford Brae junction to Main Street, Wallace Park Exit from car park, Paris Bridge and Wicks of Baiglie junctions.
- 2.CCllr Arnold has resigned from the Binn Farm Community Forum. His place will be taken by CCllr Ponton although CCllr Armstrong will attend the next meeting.
- 3.A letter of support for the GDIB Railway Wall Restoration & Conservation project has been sent.

- 4. The Council noted that whilst it is not mandatory, it is expected that recipients of grants and donations should acknowledge receipts of monies. Foundation Scotland also requests an annual report on the allocation of the CBF Micro Grant, which should include a report from recipients on the outcome of the expenditure.
- 5. Newsletter printing ongoing discussions with printers.
