News from Loch Leven Health Centre

Christmas and New Year Closing

Over the Christmas and New Year period, Loch Leven Heath Centre will be closed on the following dates:

Wednesday 25 th December	Closed

On all other weekdays over the Christmas and New Year period we will be open as usual from 8:00 a.m. until 6:00 p.m.. Out of Hours cover for evenings and weekends is provided by NHS24 and the Fife Primary Care Emergency Service. They will also be providing emergency cover on the Wednesdays and Thursdays when we are closed. They can be contacted on our usual emergency number – 01577 865252. All calls will be recorded and we would ask patients to please only contact them with a medical emergency which cannot wait until we re-open. Thank you.

We would ask all patients to please make sure that they have sufficient medication to last over the Christmas and New Year period. If your medication will run out over Christmas and New Year, please ensure that you submit a request for your medication by Thursday 19th December. We receive a greatly increased number of requests at this time of year and therefore need a bit of time to process them all. Repeat prescriptions may now be ordered on line. If you have not yet signed up for this service, you can do so on our website: www.lochlevenhealthcentre.co.uk

If you have sufficient medication to last over this period, please do not submit a request for more. Prescription requests are all checked prior to issue, and where it appears that sufficient medication has recently been issued, further requests may be declined.

The Nursing Team is in the midst of a change of personnel at present. Liz Walkingshaw, Carol Fullerton and Susan Allan are leaving us and we wish them every success in their new roles. We are delighted that two new nurses, Jerry Maggs and Heather Watters will be joining the Nursing Team in December and Sharon Porter will be taking on a Health Care Assistant role. It will take some weeks for them to settle into their new roles and clinics might be a bit restricted during their induction period but we hope that by early next year the team will back to full strength.







Anyone seen Birnam Wood?

Does the weather affect the spread of wood land? Quite a few trees in Scotland distribute their seed by the wind, for example, Birch, Sycamore, Ash and Scots Pine. In a 10km/hr wind, sycamore seeds will fly over 60m from the parent tree. Most birch seed falls within 50m of the tree, but some seed will travel over one kilometre. My good friend, H. R. Oobit, has witnessed birch seed skiting over frozen snow, covering great distances.

The graph shows wind direction over the last three years, from September to October when most seed dispersal occurs. The dominant wind direction during this period is from the south west quarter. Which would suggest that around Glenfarg, the majority of seed would be blown towards the north east.



Now if trees were left to their own devices, the probable spread of saplings would be favoured in one direction over any other. Which, over time, would see the wood move along that wind driven path. In theory this steady progress would only be stopped by unfavourable terrain or a change in climate.

ARE YOU READY FOR WINTER/EMERGENCIES?



In recent years Glenfarg and the surrounding area has suffered heavy snowfalls, gale force winds and electricity blackouts. It could happen again so here is some advice and suggestions to help you prepare for a bad winter and emergencies:

❖ If you lost your electricity supply, how will you see in the dark? How will you keep warm? How will you cook food? Do you have a log burner or a coal fire? Do you have cylinder gas?

Think about having torches (and spare batteries) handy or camping type lanterns. Consider also camping gas cookers and portable gas heaters.

Do you have a caravan you could use or can you go to a relative, neighbour or friend?

Consider whether you need a portable generator and whether you want to be able to connect it directly into your electrical circuits (our local electricians can advise).

Keep enough food, water and other essentials in your home to last at least 3 days. Tinned and dried foods are ideal as they have a long shelf life.

Remember, if you lose your electricity supply your refrigerator and freezer will no longer work.

Think about how you will cook/reheat food if you have no electricity.

Don't forget your pet(s) – keep a couple of extra tins of pet food in your cupboard.

If you lose your electricity supply you will also lose your television, mains radio and probably your internet connection and landline telephone. So think about how you will keep in touch. If you have a mobile phone and a storm is forecast, keep it fully charged and use it sparingly in case the electricity is off for several days.

Do you have a battery powered or wind up radio so you can listen to local news and warnings? Again, don't forget to have some spare batteries.

Keep emergency telephone numbers handy: NHS 24, Scottish Hydro, Scottish Water, etc. (All these are listed in the Glenfarg Newsletter).

- Do you know how to turn off your water supply and your electricity supply in an emergency?
- Do you have a snow shovel and some salt readily available?
- Driving/travel: If the weather is really bad you should consider whether you need to travel. If you cannot postpone your journey:
 - Check the weather forecast and road conditions;
 - Allow extra time;
 - Take a fully charged mobile phone;
 - Ensure your car is ready for severe weather and consider fitting winter tyres;
 - In your car carry: an ice scraper and de-icer, a torch, warm clothes and a blanket, a first aid kit, battery jump leads, a snow shovel, food and a warm drink in a flask
- Finally, please remember Glenfarg is a community, we help each other: if it is safe to do so, check on your neighbours, particularly if they are elderly, alone, vulnerable or have young children. Help each other to clear snow, do shopping, collect medicines, etc.



members typically save between £35-£75 **per delivery** by buying through GOBS.





Glenfarg Conversation Survey

Thank you for taking the time to complete your 'Glenfarg Conversation Survey' and playing a part in the future of your community. The survey summary will be included in the Glenfarg Profile document which will be finalised at an open meeting on 10th December in the Village Hall.

The survey was completed by 15.7% of the village -24.7% of these were by people aged 25-49, 44.2% aged 50-64 and 31.2% over 65. Disappointingly there was 0% response from residents under the age of 25.

Question 6 of the survey asked what residents value and appreciate most about the Village.

Out of the 51 responses to this question:-

34 people mentioned Glenfarg is – 'friendly', 'has a community spirit', 'sense of community', 'supportive neighbours and friends'.

14 answers included amenities ie. Shop, Hotel, Garage.



3 responses mentioned the school.

The general feel was that the community appreciates the wide range of activities on offer and the efforts of the people organising and running these.

Question 7 asked 'What would you like to change about your community?'

Overwhelmingly the community would like to see the demolition/redevelopment of the Lomond Hotel.

Other comments included:-

The provision of retirement housing. Reduction of speed limits.

More local footpaths / cycleways.

Improved public transport.

Upgrading of Wallace Park.

Community energy project.

Communication.

Questions 8/9. What do you think are the priorities for the community of Glenfarg?

The priorities for the community have been made clear by your opinion and comments. Improvement of community buildings and land is a high importance, mainly due to the desire to see the site of the Lomond Hotel redeveloped.

The responses that were received came from a cross section of the community with varied interests.

In order of priority, the highest rated 10 issues in need of consideration are:

- 1. Improve the appearance of the Village.
- 2. Add to and improve the local network of paths/cycleways.
- 3. Improving energy efficiency.
- 4. Conservation and enhancement of the natural environment.
- 5. Improving sports and recreational facilities.
- 6. More or enhanced activities/services for young people.
- 7. Improving community buildings and land.
- 8. Community renewable energy schemes.
- 9. Provision of care services.
- 10. Activities/services for older people.

Questions 9/10. The Current upper limit of awards from the Lochelbank Fund is £2000 per application. Do you think this should remain the same?

52.2% of responses thought this should remain the same.

Questions 11/12. What local activities do you take part in?

The survey responses came from a wide cross section of the community with representation from all the Village organisations excepting the under 25 groups.

Question 13. What other activities would you like to see happen in the Village?

11 responses to this question included mention of walking / cycling / gym equipment.

Various classes were suggested including:-

Theatre / drama. Youth Club. Evening classes. Allotment group. Dancing. Quiz league. Handicrafts. Music events.



SURVEY CONCLUSION

The Glenfarg Conversation Survey, which can be viewed in its entirety on the village website www.glenfarg.org, has produced some very interesting and illuminating answers and perhaps for some a few new questions!

The factual answers have added to the basic data in our Village Profile; the remaining more subjective answers have turned out to be quite fascinating.

Of particular note we must be especially pleased at the overwhelming appreciation of the extent to which our community enjoys a high degree of community spirit and friendliness. Also mentioned with high praise were the amenities of our 'place' - the Village Store, the Hotel, the Garage and the School not forgetting the Church and the Village Hall. These are all the things which go together to make up our community and these, added to our pride and appreciation of the community spirit makes Glenfarg a place really worth living in and doing things to maintain and improve it.

The principal object of the Survey was to establish, for the Lochelbank Community Benefit Panel (LCBP) and any other funding bodies, a clear and factual indication as to what Glenfarg is and then what it seeks to do, over the coming years, to maintain and improve for the benefit of its inhabitants. The survey has given plenty of guidance in this respect and will provide us all with the necessary guidance for our plans and actions in the future.

The top priority was 'Improving the appearance of the Village'. From the numerous comments it is concluded that the removal or redevelopment of the Lomond Hotel is the main driver in most peoples' minds at the moment.

'Adding to and improving the local path network' came in at second

place and this choice will not only maintain the attention of the LBCP but will also come to the notice of the 'Tracks' committee and P&KC.

'Improving energy efficiency' and 'Community renewable energy schemes' also rated highly (third overall) and their prominence in your answers illustrates the importance that you attached to them. This gives a clear mandate to those wishing to pursue energy related proposals within the village.

The survey sought not only to establish the 'High' priorities but it also asked for 'Medium' 'low' and 'not important' views. The answers you gave give clear direction for any groups within the Community who should look for guidance and support for projects and future development.

It is now up to Glenfarg to respond by getting its collective act together to make sure that it produces projects that meet with the indicated preferences and which LCBP and other funding bodies can see their way to supporting. The survey and the Profile will provide the rationale for these funding bodies to make decisions as to who and what they will support.

Scout Group Family Camp

An advance party of six scouts and the leaders headed to the Barr Wood, Forth Valley Scouts camp site on the Friday night to set up camp. It was a dry evening with enough of a breeze to keep the midges away. Knowing the weather forecast the scouts were given two man "force ten" tents which they found challenging to pitch.

The fires were easily lit and breakfast cooked. Eliot demonstrated just how hot the pot handles get by melting a hole in his fleece taking the pot off the fire. After breakfast the scouts joined the Forth Valley Cubs, Scouts and Explorers for flag break on the Saturday morning, Struan was asked to join the flag party.

The cubs and beavers arrived with their parents and pitched their tents before joining the scouts for an orienteering game that took them to the far corners of the campsite. Robert had them struggling on the scavenger hunt, asking them for a sycamore leaf – there are no sycamores on site. Beth found some tiny frogs and Mitchell a brilliant green caterpillar with huge eyes.

After lunch the scouts, cubs, beavers and parents were divided into teams to build an obstacle course in the woods. The scouts, cubs and beavers then raced each other round the course.

MINUTES OF THE MEETING HELD 2/9/13

The minutes were agreed as a true record of the meeting, proposed by CCIIr Johnson and seconded by CCIIr Vaughan.

MATTERS ARISING

- Cheques from the fete proceeds have been distributed and letters of thanks received.
- 2. The letter of support requested by the Tennis Club has been endorsed and sent.
- 3. Verge cutting priority areas have been forwarded to PKCC.
- 4. Heritage Trust are interested in clearing and tidying the area surrounding Arngask Church and have requested details of the land owner to proceed as they have support from PKCC. This had been sent.
- 5. A letter has been sent to KLEO to offer the Glenfarg marquee. The KLEO committee have not had a meeting to discuss this as yet.
- 6. Lomond Hotel update. There was an article in the Courier. The building standards officer visited the site and is going to contact David Craigie. The barrier is at a safe distance from the building to

constrain any falling debris. Funding has been secured for partial demolition of the building and new plans are being submitted for the site. CCllr Vaughan will contact Isobel Butt, Building Standards Officer at P&KC. A letter will be sent to David Craigie by the GCC, mentioning the high priority given by residents in the Glenfarg Conversation survey to removing what has become an eyesore, but also offering the support of the GCC in any way that may progress the matter.

Springhall - application for access to the land behind the buildings

A Meteorological mast for Binn Farm.

Phases 1 and 2 of Stephens development have been passed. The Village request for consideration on a mini roundabout at the entrance to the site has been rejected. Consideration should be given

to moving the 30mph limit to the bottom of Caulfield Brae. There is provision for 2 lit bus shelters at either side of the main road close to the entrance.

An appeal has been lodged against the refused application at Tillyrie.

Shell are being consulted regarding the Stephens development, although they own the furthest away of the pipelines, the Shell one carries the most volatile material.

GLENFARG CONVERSATION

CCIIr Ponton gave an update of the progress of the 'Conversation' committee including a brief history to the reasons for the survey. A public meeting will be held in Glenfarg Village Hall on 10th December to discuss the findings.

NURSING ASSOCIATION FUND

A Public access defibrillator (PAD) is to be purchased and positioned centrally in the Village. This will cost c.£1500. The balance of the fund will be discussed at the January meeting.

HEALTHY COMMUNITIES COLLABORATIVE

Caroline Waring, the Fire Brigade and Ineke Watt to be contacted to coordinate the progression of a talk on fire safety in the home and the checking of electric blankets by the Fire Service.

HISTORICAL MINUTES OF THE GLENFARG DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

Minute books from 1925-1976 of the Development Committee have been given to the Village. CCllr Macpherson will digitalise these and keep safe. Copies will be available for download from the website.

CORRESPONDENCE + AOCB

1. The War Memorial - Concern noted re water coming off fields possibly underlining the surrounding wall. Unclear as to how this

- might be resolved. P&KC will not, at this stage, point the surrounding wall. War Memorial Trust to be approached to establish what they might support.
- The village road markings have been refreshed but Duncrievie and Drunzie have been missed.
- 3. The kerb and pavement alongside the 'Drysdale development' is dangerous, with a 5inch drop where new services had been buried. CCllr Arnold to speak to Planning & Road Safety Depts at P&KC. (Post Meeting Note this has now been rectified)
- 4. The memorial service will be at 4pm on Sunday following the 3pm Church service.
- 5. The fete committee have requested an open meeting to discuss the distribution of fete funds. It was agreed to hold a joint village meeting on 10th December, when this matter and the Glenfarg Conversation Survey results could be discussed. (Following the meeting, the Glenfarg Conversation group rejected this proposal and retain the 10th December date for the Survey meeting. CCllr MacKenzie has agreed to chair the Fete Proceeds meeting some time in the new year.)
