
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
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Newsletter Editor Vacancy

The Book Sale held on Wednesday 13th November raised \pounds 26. Many thanks to Mrs Imrie and the children in P3/4.


Curling

*This was the question that caught most people out. The British Government **first** ordered troops into Afghanistan in 1838, the invasion started in the spring of 1839. The withdrawal in 1842 turned into a rout with virtually the entire military force of 4,500 and some 12,000 camp followers being killed by Afghan tribesmen or succumbing to the freezing conditions. Of the 16,500 who left Kabul, the only Briton to reach Jalalabad and safety was Dr William Brydon. The British also invaded and fought in Afghanistan in 1878-1880 (2nd Afghan War) and 1919 (3rd Afghan War), again with heavy losses to British forces. Glenfarg Renewable Energy Association

The Glenfarg Conversation highlighted the top priorities that local residents felt were important for the village. The third most important area highlighted by local residents in that survey was to do something about energy saving and renewable energy.

Now a new association has been set up in Glenfarg to promote energy saving and renewable energy projects in the village and surrounding area. This association is a response to the priorities expressed in the Glenfarg Conversation survey.

A small group of interested locals have set up the new association - and would like to invite others interested in this high priority work to join them.

Starting with an open meeting in the Hall, the opportunities to save on energy bills through conservation will be presented. There is always more that can be done to economise on fuel – through better insulation, reducing consumption, buying more efficient appliances and using them more efficiently. This meeting will make professional advice and practical help available locally. Watch out for notices advising on date and time in due course.

Besides working to help residents to reduce energy use, the association will be looking into all the various ways

in which renewable energy might be sustainably produced locally. The community is already benefitting from one source of renewable energy – wind power at Lochelbank. The fund established through this project is providing valuable support to many Glenfarg organisations. Elsewhere a number of smaller windpower generators have been installed. Many residents have installed photovoltaic panels on their roofs, and there is a programme to install solar thermal panels too. Other residents have switched to heat pumps or wood fuel for their heating needs. Many of these sources of "green energy" are supported by finance from the government. Glenfarg Renewable Energy Association will look into these and other opportunities which might generate power locally; either to reduce energy bills directly, or indirectly through selling power through the National Grid. It is intended that the association provide a local point of contact where you can find out more about the government's green energy programmes.

If you are interested in supporting the work of this new association then please get in touch with one of the founding members: Cedric Wilkins, Simon Morton, Alistair Johnston, Tim Corcoran and David Aird. They will be able to let you know when the next meeting of the association will take place and what the plans are for the future.

A letter from your about to be minister!

I am writing to you as though I were already the parish minister, but that does not happen for another two weeks, but for reasons of time and printing I have to put pen to paper, or nowadays, keyboard to screen.

However by the time you read this, we may have at least shaken hands at the church door. I am looking forward to the Induction service on January 21st, and I do hope the extremely cold weather which is presently in the United States does not interfere with that night. I have discouraged the congregations of Glencoe and Duror from hiring a bus in order to attend that service, it would not be sensible to risk 90 miles of late night travel on icy roads, but a number have booked accommodation in or around Glenfarg or Abernethy, so I am delighted about that.

The manse has been redecorated and looks really good, I hope that once the new parking area is complete, you will feel able to visit; I have always had an open-door policy in whatever Manse I have been living in. Of course with the reduced percentage of ministry we are now involved in, I will from time to time, take a few days away in my camper-van, this is a great way of travelling when you have dogs, as it means you can visit friends, but they do not have to put up with muddy paws in their house, and there is no need to hunt for dog friendly places to stay.

I know of some concerns that I am only employed on a 70% basis, but that does not mean that you only get 70% ministry. My commitment to the parish is 100%, just as it has been in Glencoe and Duror, where the same system operated, in fact slightly less than 70%. Therefore, although this is a new experience for you as a congregation, I have had more than two years of this kind of ministry. We do not worship alone, we have the guidance and strength of the Holy Spirit, and if we need reminding about how to cope with challenge and change, we need only read the scriptures, from Genesis to Revelation there are stories of new ways of living in faith, hope and love.

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
Baby and Toddler Group

Glenfarg gets its own PAD (Public Access Defibrillator)



Hopefully you will have noticed the green box attached to the outside of the village shop.

It is a PAD (Public Access Defibrillator) that the Glenfarg Community Council has funded. The owners of the Village Shop kindly agreed to it being positioned on their property - a visible and central position in the village.

Why does Glenfarg need a PAD?

- Sudden Cardiac Arrest is the UK's biggest killer over 250 people die every day
- Sudden Cardiac Arrest can strike anyone, anytime, anywhere without warning
- Together with CPR, defibrillation is the only way to reestablish the heart's normal rhythm
- Current survival rates for out of hospital cardiac arrest is less than 5%, with defibrillation available this can be more than 50%
- CPR alone = 5% survival CPR + AED = 50% survival

- A casualty's chance of survival decreases by up to 10% every minute defibrillation is delayed
- Defibrillators or AED's (Automated External Defibrillators like our PAD) are safe and simple to use
- Anyone can use a Public Access Defibrillator, no previous experience of CPR or defibrillators is required

When do you need to use a defibrillator (PAD)?

Casualty unresponsive, not breathing or taking infrequent noisy breathes?

- Phone 999 this is vital, the emergency services know the village has a defibrillator and will help
- Send someone to collect the defibrillator it is in a small fully transportable case kept in the green box
- Start CPR immediately/follow 999 call handlers guidance while waiting for the defibrillator to arrive
- When defibrillator arrives press Green on-button listen carefully to and follow instructions given by the PAD – it talks you through everything you need to do and has visual aids to guide you
- Time Counts don't delay <u>YOU</u> can do it!

The cabinet which houses the PAD is security tag sealed but unlocked. During the day you will notice a green flashing light and white LED's flash at night to show location and a **loud alarm** and flashing red LED's come on when the cabinet is opened.

What next?

An awareness training session will be held in the Village Hall on **Saturday 8th February from 2pm - 4pm**. All are welcome – from those with first aid/medical training to those with no first aid knowledge.

Grateful thanks from the whole community goes to our local electrician, John Allison, for fitting the PAD free of charge. Thank you John.


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


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"Arthur Christmas" at the Glenfarg Cinema

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Happy Solstice

The 21st December is an important day in the weather calender. It is the winter solstice when Glenfarg (and, of course, the rest of the northern hemisphere) is the furthest from the sun. The earth spins around the sun on a tilted axis. So for half of the year we are relatively closer to the sun and for the other half, further away. On two days in the year, the equinoxes, we are mid way through this progression when length of day equals length of night.

The consequence of being tilted away from the sun means that the sun does not rise as high in the sky in winter and its rays must also pass through a thicker layer of our atmosphere. The result is that we receive less energy making the weather appreciably colder. The graph shows the difference in energy received in Glenfarg from a typical week in July and from a week in November. Although some losses are due to shading, the difference is quite striking.

At the time of the winter solstice, temperatures are still pretty high around the equator. Lands near the equator receive about eight times as much energy from the sun as we do. As well as vacuums, nature abhors variations in temperature and a lot of our weather comes about from the mixing of warm tropical air and cold polar air. The battle line where this occurs is in the North Atlantic. Warm air from the south rises above cold from the north in huge volatile anticlockwise spirals. The results are a doleful looking Tomasz Schafernaker and the all too typical wet and windy weather which we have experienced a lot of this winter.

But don't despair. The winter solstice has passed and we are gently tilting back towards the sun. Look forward to the 21st June, the summer solstice, when we will once more relive the warm, balmy weather of a Scottish summer.

Old Foggie

Marindin Park, where does the name come from?

When Stephens built the houses at the North end of the village, I wondered where the name for the development came from and why it was used. If you were also curious, read on!

The road was named after a wealthy benefactor to many local charities: Major General A.H. Marindin, D.S.O., C.B., of Fordel. The Marindin family owned both Fordel and Easterton; Easterton being occupied for some time by Miss Eve Marindin, daughter of Maj Gen. Marindin. The original name of the Fordel estate was "Paris", hence the name of the Paris Bridge over the motorway.

Maj. Gen. Marindin was commissioned into the Black Watch (RHR) as a Lieutenant in 1891 and served in the army from then until 1919. At the final stage of World War I he was a Brigadier General in charge of the 35th Division.

In 1895, while serving in Mauritius, he became frustrated that the new, more accurate, personal weapon of his men (the rifle) was hampered by the inaccuracy of defining the distance to targets. With that in mind he devised an optical Range Finder. It was successful in a competition, held between 1902 and 1906, to define the Range Finder to be used by the Army. Unfortunately due to a disagreement between the specifiers of military equipment (the Ordinance Department) and the users (the War Department, who wanted to use the Glasgow-produced Barr & Stroud Range Finder) virtually no Range Finders were ordered, which meant we went into World War I with very few in service! An example of his Range Finder can be seen in the Black Watch Museum by Bell's Sport Centre in Perth. Stop for lunch or a coffee in the excellent Café and you will see a large painting of the Battle of Waterloo, painted by W.B. Woolen in 1815, on the end wall. The picture was bought with a bequest from this famous son of the Regiment; to the end his primary enthusiasm was for his old regiment, whose museum benefited greatly from the magnificent collection of relics and prints which he bequeathed to it. If you haven't been to the Museum recently you should go, it was reopened after a complete refurbishment last July and is a fascinating insight into our local Regiment. With its free parking and close to the centre of the town, it is also an ideal place for a quick lunch!

Maj Gen. Maridin also published a book (when a Captain) on the Salamanca Campaign in July 1812 during the Peninsula War. Wellington's army of 48,600 suffered 5,200 casualties during this action, but inflicted in the region of 14,000 casualties on Marmont's 50,000-strong army and was probably Wellington's most impressive military success up to that time.

Coming much closer to home, however, he was also a benefactor in the village. He gifted the ground for the football pitch behind the school for the use of the school for sports. It is quite fitting that the road named after him finishes at the start of his bequest.

Major-General A. H. Marindin, D.S.O., C.B., died in 1947.

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
