the joy of love and being loved, but it has rather lost some impact since the cuddly penguins from John Lewis are now selling on e-bay for £500 each!!



Glenfarg Bike trip to Aberdour:

A Bridge Two Forths. Contrived or what???!!!

Anyway, what initially looked like a 21 mile doddle down the M90 corridor to the Forth was actually a 60-mile-plus haul for 38 bikers from Glenfarg on September 20th, and then a lovely weave back through beautiful Fife countryside on the



Sunday. And not a drop of rain on either day! It was an 8:30 start we made from the hotel, down and around the loch to the Cleish Hills then contouring along the hills to Saline for a fabulous breakfast at Saline Golf Club. After that, over the hills and far away to Culross and up the Forth to Kincardine Bridge. But also I'd like to thank everyone who has taken part in any of the rides. 




It was our aim to raise £1000, to put towards Murrin's chair which totals a cost of £4000. It is with great pleasure and pride

Glenfarg Village Hall

Annual Report 2014

The Hall committee is a group of local volunteers who endeavour to ensure that the Hall is genuinely a "Hall for All". The assets of the Hall are held in Trust by



Capita Trustees, but all decisions relating to the hall are made by the local management committee. The hall has seen some new activities recently, including the Community Cinema and chair exercises. Arngask Primary School has continued to make good use of the hall for parties, as well as the annual prize giving. The scouts have also held a number of events including a Burns night and a pudding night. The Arngask Parish Church once again held the Remembrance Day service in the hall. The hall has also been used for a wedding, Hogmanay party, fund raising events, "soup and a chat", commercial presentations, mother and baby club, accordion and fiddle club, badminton, yoga, tennis club, WRI, Scouts, Cubs, Brownies, Rainbows and Beavers, Folk Club, Arngask Church, and a variety of community meetings, elections and private functions. The hall diary is maintained on the Glenfarg Village website and users are encouraged to check availability before making bookings via email.

The Statement of Financial Activities shows a small operating loss for the year to March 31 2014 of £381 after setting aside one off project grants and the write off of accumulated bad debt. The committee has continued to reduce running costs through more efficient management of the hall. Maintenance costs remain very low, as the majority of repairs this year have been carried out at cost by volunteers. Over the past year some repair work has been carried out to the roof and rones, and the hall has been redecorated. A dish washer has been installed in the kitchen, and the lighting in the hall has been renewed with energy saving lamps. I would like to thank our Property Convenor, Tim Corcoran, for all the work he has done to keep the hall in good shape.

Holding recurring costs down has once again allowed charges to be held at the

same level for the fifth year in succession. The simple hourly charging structure is both fair and affordable, and compares well with similar facilities in other communities. The hall has once again benefitted from donations – notably from the Fete – for which, many thanks. These donations, together with rental income, have ensured the continuing financial viability of the hall.

Following the acquisition of the site adjacent to the rear of the hall, the work, commenced in the previous year, has been completed. All grants offered in relation to funding of that project have now been received and the "Garden at Glenfarg Hall" was formally opened with a garden party on Saturday September 7th 2013. A cake was cut by Mrs Jean Ross, neighbour of the hall. The committee wishes to thank all the funders of this project: Perth and Kinross Community Environment Challenge Fund and the Quality of Life Trust, Awards for All Lottery Fund, The Scottish Government and Rural LEADER Programme, RWE NPower Renewables Lochelbank Community Fund, and the Glenfarg Community Council.

I would like to thank all our committee members, without whom the hall could not function. Thanks also to Elaine Morton who was, until recently, looking after the hall bookings; and to the hall cleaner, Kareen MacGregor. From time to time the hall receives donations - and I would like to thank all those who have generously supported this community facility.

With the completion of the Garden and car park the hall committee has plans to encourage the use of the garden for a range of outdoor activities. Although options are limited, signage to the hall from Main Street will receive attention, and funds are being sought to carry out this work.

The hall can only function with the help of our volunteer committee members. Many of the current committee have served for several years, and the whole community has benefitted from their support over the years. We now need new people to come forward to join the committee and share the job of looking after the hall. The committee meets quarterly, so being a committee member is not particularly demanding of your time. If you have read this report, and are interested in the future of the hall, then please talk to me on 830300 and consider helping out on the committee. We would warmly welcome new members!

ARE YOU READY FOR WINTER/EMERGENCIES?

In recent years Glenfarg and the surrounding area has suffered heavy snowfalls, gale force winds and electricity blackouts. It could happen again so here is some advice and suggestions to help you prepare for a bad winter and emergencies:

If you lost your electricity supply, how will you see in the dark? How will you keep warm? How will you cook food? Do you have a log burner or a coal fire? Do you have cylinder gas?

Think about having torches (and spare batteries) handy or camping type lanterns. Consider also camping gas cookers and portable gas heaters.

Do you have a caravan you could use or can you go to a relative, neighbour or friend?

Consider whether you need a portable generator and whether you want to be able to connect it directly into your electrical circuits (our local electricians can advise).

Keep enough food, water and other essentials in your home to last at least 3 days. Tinned and dried foods are ideal as they have a long shelf life.

Remember, if you lose your electricity supply your refrigerator and freezer will no longer work.

Think about how you will cook/reheat food if you have no electricity.

Don't forget your pet(s) – keep a couple of extra tins of pet food in your cupboard.

If you lose your electricity supply you will also lose your television, mains radio and probably your internet connection and landline telephone. So think about how you will keep in touch. If you have a mobile phone and a storm is forecast, keep it fully charged and use it sparingly in case the electricity is off for several days.

Do you have a battery powered or wind up radio so you can listen to local news and warnings? Again, don't forget to have some spare batteries.

Keep emergency telephone numbers handy: NHS 24, Scottish Hydro, Scottish Water, etc. (All these are listed in the Glenfarg Newsletter).

Do you know how to turn off your water supply and your electricity supply in an emergency?

Do you have a snow shovel and some salt readily available?

Driving/travel: If the weather is really bad you should consider whether you need to travel. If you cannot postpone your journey:

- Check the weather forecast and road conditions;
- Allow extra time:
- Take a fully charged mobile phone;
- Make sure your car is ready for severe weather and consider fitting winter tyres;
- In your car carry: an ice scraper and de-icer, a torch, warm clothes and a blanket, a first aid kit, battery jump leads, a snow shovel, food and a warm drink in a flask

Finally, please remember Glenfarg is a community, we help each other: if it is safe to do so, check on your neighbours, particularly if they are elderly, alone, vulnerable or have young children. Help each other to clear snow, do shopping, collect medicines, etc.

Christmas Pudding

A proper Christmas Pudding is part of the traditional Christmas Day fare. This recipe is simple to prepare and can be steamed, microwaved or cooked in a pressure cooker – as long as you cook it before Christmas and re-heat on the day. It is cooked in a two pint pudding basin and will serve eight.

225g/ 8oz mixed fruit including currants, raisins and sultanas 25g/1oz each of glace cherries, candied peel and stoned prunes, chopped half a lemon and half an orange – the grated rind and juice

1 small apple peeled, cored and chopped

75g/3oz shredded vegetarian suet

50g/2oz fresh breadcrumbs

50g/2oz dark soft brown sugar

40g/1.5oz plain flour

25g/1oz ground almonds

1/2 teaspoon mixed spice and a pinch of ground ginger

1 small egg

1/4 pint stout

50ml/2fl oz rum or brandy or sherry or madeira

1 tablespoon milk

Method:

Mix together all of the dried fruit, apple, peel, cherries, prunes, suet, breadcrumbs, sugar, flour, ground almonds, spices, orange and lemon rind and juice in a large bowl.

Beat the egg with the milk and pour into a well in the dry ingredients. Then stir in the stout and your choice of spirits and mix it all together. A lot of stirring is required and traditionally everyone in the family would have a turn at stirring the mixture.

When everything is well mixed, cover the bowl with cling film or foil and leave it to stand in a cool place for 24 hours.

Give the mixture another stir before transferring it to a greased 2 pint pudding basin. Prepare a domed lid that is much wider than the bowl from a double layer of greaseproof paper or baking parchment and tie it on securely with string. It is now time to cook the pudding.

Steaming – 8 hours, on a trivet in a large pan, making ensure that the pan does not boil dry. Pressure cook – Use a triple layer of greaseproof paper for the lid, or a single layer of paper plus a layer of foil – tied securely. Steam for 30 minutes then cook at pressure for 2 and a half hours

Microwave – in this case the cover can be cling film. Cook for 8 minutes at 650 watts

Once the pudding is cooked, allow it to cool down completely before removing the cover and wrapping it in fresh greaseproof paper for storage until it is needed. This pudding improves with keeping.

Reheat by steaming for a couple of hours or reheat in the microwave for 2-3 minutes at 650 watt.

My brother in law always serves this covered with flaming brandy, spectacular in low light, and definitely adding to the taste

Glenfarg Paths Group

We had a paths meeting recently. This is the group which came from the Glenfarg Conversation towards the end of last year, 2013. And largely due to the input of Rob Duncan, one of our newest Community Councillors, we have made great progress. We are on the verge of printing a leaflet which incorporates Perth and Kinross Council's work towards a Core Path network, with favourite routes around Glenfarg, Arngask, Duncrievie, Drunzie, Old Fargie, Rossie Ochil and environs.


There are routes long and short, including short rounds of the Hilltown and of Arngask and Wallace Park. The longer ones go round Lochelbank and the reservoir. Our intention is to launch our routes when PKC are ready to launch their Core Paths. We want to have everything ready for March next year. Then, on March 28th, we have this idea for lots of inhabitants and friends of Glenfarg deciding which of the walks they would like to 'christen'. We would then stagger departure times so that everyone out on a walk ends up back at a predetermined destination at, say, 5pm for a bit of a social event. It would be a great way of declaring that winter was done!

On other issues, we have submitted pictures of the main road footpath between Cafford Brae and the 30 limit on the approach to the village. This was the area that people were disappointed with, and it's hoped that PKC will do something about it.

The drainage problem at The Avenue behind the war memorial was again discussed. This is a continuing problem which should be a great off-road route for children to get to school, but its boggy state prevents this. We decided that as this is the original "Great North Road", we would try to get a more substantial solution than the multitask approach of finding owners, applying for permission, raising funds etc. To this end, we're going to approach George Lawrie of TRACKS to see if we can get a concerted approach.

The track down from the old Arngask Church was talked about and it was agreed that the Core Path route off the hill, to the north towards Paris Bridge was a far more acceptable route than the route east towards the Manse.

The other area which we would like George to engage himself with is the route out of the Hilltown of Duncrievie. Our preferred route would be to make the stile on the core map more useable and after the right angle turn, continue on that trajectory, well to the right of the cabins and their related sauna to cross the Hilltown road about 100 yards from its junction with the Milnathort Road, and establish a new bit of path along



the field boundary to emerge onto the Milnathort road just before the Glendy turn. It's on the map attached.


We are making progress and will get our pamphlet out in the coming weeks.





GLENFARG COMMUNITY COUNCIL MINUTES OF MEETING MONDAY 3 NOVEMBER 2014

PRESENT: CCIIrs Donald MacKenzie (Chairman), Janet Watson (Secretary), Dave Arnold (Minutes), Rob Duncan, Daniel Horsman and Alex Johnston. Also present: PKC CIIrs Willie Robertson and Michael Barnacle, PC Sadie Allan and four members of the public. APOLOGIES: CCIIrs Margaret Ponton and Gillian Vaughan.

The Chairman opened the meeting with two announcements: (1) Bill Macpherson has resigned from the CC; (2) Ruby Peace, our oldest resident, has left Glenfarg and is now living in a care home in Milnathort. It was proposed by the Chairman that the CC send her a card, a bunch of flowers and our good wishes. This was agreed unanimously;

CO-OPTION OF NEW MEMBERS Rob Duncan was proposed by Donald Mackenzie and seconded by Janet Watson. Dan Horsman was proposed by Janet Watson and seconded by Donald Mackenzie. Their membership of the CC had been validated by PKC. The chairman welcomed the two new members and wished them success in their new roles.

MINUTES OF THE LAST MEETING: This was held on 1st September. The Minutes were agreed and signed as being a true record of the meeting. Proposed by CCIIr Johnston, seconded by CCIr Watson.

MATTERS ARISING:

- The Effigy in Arngask Churchyard. How to best preserve this historic effigy is still being discussed/investigated. An application has been made to the Lochelbank Community Benefit Fund to pay for advice from a stone conservation specialist. A decision on the application is due on 12th November.
- 2. Micro Grants. The latest tranche of Grant funds has now been received.
- 3. The Avenue. There was a general discussion on the need to improve The Avenue and in particular how to install effective drainage. Cllr Watson made it clear that the gravel along the War Memorial wall was infill from when P&KC laid the drainage pipe and had not been dumped or caused the flood. From the floor, Ced Wilkins said he had emailed Jan Pedley with suggestions for Balfour Beatty who were offering volunteers for local projects. it was unclear whether this request was sufficiently detailed for Balfour Beatty. It was also thought that Tim Corcoran and the Paths Group might be

- looking at the possibility of TRACKS taking over The Avenue. It became clear this matter requires a more co-ordinated approach and, as a first step, the Secretary was asked to contact PKC to see if they hold any plans (inc. drainage) for The Avenue.
- 4. <u>Hilton of Duncrievie Core Path</u>. The Paths Group is still looking at ways of linking the two existing paths and ensuring they are usable. However they have been unsuccessful in contacting the TRACKS Officer. Cllr Robertson offered to speak to George Lawrie, the TRACKS Officer to try and get some action on this matter.
- 5. <u>Tennis Club Pavilion</u>. The rubble has been removed and the area grassed, as originally planned.
- 6. <u>Binn Farm Landfill Site</u>. A letter has been received from the operator (SITA) explaining its decision to close the Landfill Site in September. This was in response to the chairman's letter of concern about how the matter had been handled.
- 7. <u>Glenfarg Emergency Plan</u>. CCllr Arnold gave an update on the Glenfarg Emergency Plan:
 - a. The Plan is now ready for uploading onto the village website. It was agreed unanimously that it will include CCllrs landline home numbers only (i.e., not their home addresses, e-mail addresses or mobile numbers).
 - b. Safety helmets, tabards, etc., for use by CCllrs and volunteers have been purchased. They will be located in the Village Hall in the near future.
 - c. A new version of the EP will be issued to all CCIIrs in the next week or so.
- 8. <u>Police Report.</u> PC Sadie Allan was present and referred to her written report that had been circulated prior to the meeting:
 - a. Tools were stolen from a van in Melville Terrace, Glenfarg.
 - b. There have been some break-ins in Kinross.
 - c. Some counterfeit notes (mostly £20 but some £10) have been circulating in the area. Banks, shops, etc., have been alerted.
 - PC Allan also confirmed that PC Dougie Stapleton has been moved to other duties and that she is now the Community Officer for Glenfarg and all of Kinross-shire. CCllr Arnold commented that this makes her our fifth Community Police Officer in around two years and that this was unsatisfactory.
- 9. <u>Treasurer's Report</u>. In the Treasurer's absence, the Chairman gave a summary of her report (circulated prior to the meeting). He noted that the total funds held was a healthy £12,010 but added that a good proportion of that was already earmarked for various community projects.
 - The Treasurer requested permission to pay PKC for the erection of the Christmas

- Lights in Main Street (this should be around £500). This was agreed unanimously.
- 10. <u>Road Safety Report</u>. CCllr Vaughan accompanied by CCllrs Arnold and Watson had a meeting with PKC's Road Safety Officers on 31st October 2014. The Chairman in the absence of CCllr Vaughan relayed the main points of her report (which had been circulated prior to the meeting):
 - a. Road Safety & Lighting at the Ladeside/Church Brae/Greenbank Road crossroads will be the subject of surveys by PKC.
 - b. A Road Safety Survey will also be carried out by PKC of the junction of Ladeside with Main Street i.e., by the hotel. PKC will consider putting in white lines to deter parking on the corners, also extending the junction and footpaths out into Main Street.
 - c. PKC will investigate and cost the installation of electronic speed signs at either end of Main Street.

It was suggested that the Nursing Fund might be used to purchase the electronic speed signs, although other suggestions may also be made. A final decision would be made when full costings were available.

- 11. <u>Planning Report</u>. CCllr Johnston, as lead of the Planning Sub-Committee, gave a summary of his Planning Report (which had been circulated prior to the meeting). This summary included:
 - a. A potted history of the cattle court/agricultural storage shed at the Hilton of Duncrievie. The latest application is 14/01826/FLL.
 - b. The refusal of a wind turbine at Colliston Farm Duncrievie despite the lack of any objections. Cllr Barnacle noted there was currently a lot of inconsistency in decisions regarding wind turbines and that this may be improved following the Local Landscape Review which is ongoing. He also mentioned that the application for the proposed wind turbine at Temple Hill, which had been refused, is now the subject of an appeal to the Scottish Government. He also said that there was unlikely to be a public hearing and that a decision would be made on the written evidence provided and an unaccompanied visit to the site by the Reporter.
 - c. The Planning Application for the proposed Wind Farm (four turbines) at Binn Farm is due any time. It is understood that no construction traffic will pass through Glenfarg.
 - d. The Forestry Commission has purchased Springhall Farm, south-west of Glenfarg, and proposes to plant mixed woodland for commercial and

recreation purposes. A general discussion about this proposal ensued and included:

- i. The possibility of a community-owned wind turbine on site (Ced Wilkins, Glenfarg Renewable Energy Association);
- ii. Whether any public footpaths will be included (CCllr Duncan).

It is understood the Forestry Commission has organised a "Drop In Scoping Meeting" in Glenfarg Village Hall, 3.00 p.m. – 7.00 p.m. on Thursday 4th December. The Secretary was asked to ensure that details of the meeting are widely circulated and to advise those groups with a vested interest (Paths Group, GREA, etc.) to ensure they have a co-ordinated approach/objectives.

- 12. <u>Wallace Park</u>. There was a general discussion on how Wallace Park could be improved:
 - a. Cllr Barnacle reported that PKC had investigated the cause of the boggy area
 on the corner of the football pitch which had been fenced off some time ago.
 A broken drain had been found and repaired so the area should now
 gradually dry up. Once dry, the fencing will be removed.
 - b. CCIIr Duncan noted that access to the Park for baby buggies, wheelchairs and mobile scooters was difficult due to the lack of dropped kerbs, the kissing gate leading to Birch Lane, etc. CCIIr Duncan was asked to draw up a wish list of improvements and pass them to the Secretary for onward transmission to Dave Stubbs (the PKC Access Officer).
 - c. Sadie Allan said that the children's fixed wooden table/toys near the play area were dirty and covered with mould and asked if they could be cleaned. Cllr Robertson said that this would be an ideal task for community payback. All agreed. Cllr Robertson will pass details of the Payback Office to the Secretary.
 - d. Two boughs have been brought down in the recent gales. One is on the Druid's Mound near the changing rooms and the other is in the small copse near the path that runs parallel to Duncrievie Road. Neither is considered a safety hazard. Cllr Robertson volunteered to report them to the Parks Department.
 - e. CCllr Arnold noted that the flagpole is now extremely rusty and is beyond repair.
 He asked if it can be removed. The Secretary will write to PKC requesting removal.
 - f. CCllr Duncan observed that a dog mess bin is very near the children's play area and asked if it could be moved. The Secretary was asked to write to PKC to

- see if it could be moved some 6 metres towards the alleyway that leads to Elm Row i.e., next to the signpost.
- g. The Elm Row entrance to the park was observed to be very boggy, with a raised drain. Secretary to ask PKC if this can be improved.
- 13. Further Discussion on the Development of a Long Term Vision for the Community. This item had to be postponed because Tracy Ramsay, the Community Capacity Worker was unable to attend the meeting. This matter will now be discussed at the next meeting (12th January 2015). It was suggested that it would also be useful to have a member of the Planning Department present. Secretary to investigate.
- 14. <u>Correspondence</u>. The Secretary circulated a list of correspondence received since the last meeting. With regard to the question of blocked drains, it was noted that routine, programmed cleaning of drains is no longer carried out. They are now only cleaned in response to a complaint.

15. AOCB.

- a. The Secretary reported that the domain name glenfarg.scot is not yet available.
 It will be released at some future date. The Secretary has registered our interest.
- Neighbourhood Watch. No-one has come forward to take over from James
 Mason. All present were asked to keep looking for a replacement.
- c. The Secretary reported on her initial investigation into purchasing a new CC noticeboard (which will be sited on the side of the Village Shop next to the mailbox). After discussion it was agreed that a good quality, weatherproof noticeboard capable of taking around 15 A4 size pages is the ideal. The Secretary was asked to investigate further and obtain quotes.
- d. Cllr Robertson raised concerns about the availability (or not) of the reports written by Conservation Officers. It appears they are currently not routinely seen by Cllrs, CCllrs and the public when dealing with Planning Applications. He is pursuing this matter through the Council. CCllr Johnston, as lead of the Planning Sub Committee, totally agreed and supported Cllr Robertson.
- e. CCIIr Vaughan (via a note) reported that details of our Public Access Defibrillator (PAD) had been passed to the Scottish Ambulance Service. SAS are now mapping location of all PADs so when someone dials 999 for medical help, the call handler can tell them where the nearest PAD is held.
