

Christmas and New Year Closing

Over the Christmas and New Year period, Loch Leven Health Centre will be closed on the following dates:

Friday 25 th December	Closed
Monday 28 th December	Closed
Friday 1 st January	Closed
Monday 4 th January	Closed

On all other weekdays over the Christmas and New Year period we will be open as usual from 8:00 a.m. until 6:00 p.m.. Out of Hours cover for evenings and weekends is provided by NHS24 and the Fife Primary Care Emergency Service. They will also be providing emergency cover on the Fridays and Mondays when we are closed. They can be contacted on our usual emergency number –111. All calls will be recorded and we would ask patients to please only contact them with a medical emergency which cannot wait until we re-open. Thank you.

We would ask all patients to please make sure that they have sufficient medication to last over the Christmas and New Year period. If your medication will run out over Christmas and New Year, please ensure that you submit a request for your medication by Monday 21st December. We receive a greatly increased number of requests at this time of year and therefore need a bit of time to process them all. Repeat prescriptions may now be ordered on line. If you have not yet signed up for this service, you can do so on our website: www.lochlevenhealthcentre.co.uk If you have sufficient medication to last over this period, please do not submit a request for more. Prescription requests are all checked prior to issue, and where it appears that sufficient medication has been issued recently, further requests may be declined.

The doctors and all the staff at the Health Centre would like to take this opportunity to wish all their patients a merry Christmas and a happy and healthy New Year.

Take to the Hills

Never too late to 'take to the hills'

In 2006 my great friend, Douglas Robertson, and I discussed the possibility of climbing some hills and maybe 'bagging' some Munros.

In our spare time we practiced on smaller hills and low level walks to build up our fitness levels.

On 19th August 2007 we climbed our first Munro, Schiehallion. We were well and truly hooked.

We were both just over 50 years old and agreed to be sensible, not over ambitious, and therefore set a target of climbing the Munros in Tayside.

There are actually 43 within the boundary and we got through them steadily assisted by our mountain bikes on the bigger days.

Douglas purchased a book, which inspired us both, entitled 'From Glen Esk to Glen Shiel (and the hills in between)' by James L.W. Baxter,

printed by William Culross & Son Ltd in Coupar Angus. In brief it is an account of a circuit of the Munros by two 'Elderly Chaps' Jim Baxter and Dick Griffiths who had both spent their working lives as Rubber/Oil Palm Planters in Malaya (now Malaysia) but had never met prior to a reunion lunch, in Glenfarg, in 1982. They climbed all the Munros together from 1983 to 1993 and were both around 60 years old when they started!



Douglas and I walked in all seasons and particularly enjoyed our winter outings when it was safe to do so. There are so many wonderful memories, and thankfully, not too many scary moments.

We met some amazing people through walking, one in particular stands out.


On 20/02/11 at A'Chailleach (Monadh Liath) we met Robert MacDonald, from Lancashire, who at the age of around 70 was well into his 8th round of the Munros. He completed his first round in 1984. Douglas corresponds with Robert and the latest news is that he has completed his ninth round and has since climbed Ben Nevis which will be the first hill of his proposed 10th round!

Douglas and I, accompanied by family, friends and of course Cuillin, the Spaniel, completed the Munros on Saturday 29th August 2015. Our final Munro was Tom Buidhe in Glenshee. A big thank you to all who attended and to our good Ladies, Liz and Denise who braved the elements and the Midges to prepare a tasty BBQ in the car park.



So what now? Keep walking for sure. Re-visit some favourite Munros, perhaps taking different routes up, climbing more Corbetts and Graham's. Finally, a big 'hats off' to the group of '91 Glenfarg Munro completists, the near completists and the long distant Trail walkers. (photographs by Douglas)



Scout Group Family Camp

The advance party of scouts and explorers left for camp at the Barr Wood near Denny on Friday night. The site was busy with scouts from Forth Valley there for the weekend and we were placed in a different area of the 90 acre site, very near the car park. The explorers and scouts quickly transferred all the camping gear from the car park to our sites.

The scouts pitched a patrol tent for the weekend and the explorers pitched their smaller tents. As the forecast was for low temperatures overnight Erin and Cara were allowed to share one of the explorers tents.



After pitching one of the store tents, Robert realised that the petrol lantern was

still sitting on the garage floor. By the time Christine returned with the lantern all the tents had been pitched and the scouts and explorers were waiting for supper after playing a wide game. The lantern would not stay lit and headtorches were needed to serve supper.

Andrew and Robert found a dead tree on Saturday morning and the two patrols of scouts and the explorers carried sections of it back to the sites for firewood. Erin was elected to lead the explorers and quickly got the boys organised to light the fire and cook under her supervision. Grant and Oliver organised their individual patrols sharing a large fire site.

The campers were preparing for inspection as the excited cubs and beaver reinforcements arrived accompanied by their parents. The cubs were handed a camera to record the event while the adults were roped in to help at inspection allowing all three groups to be inspected at once.

Following flag break the explorers and scouts headed off for a game while the cubs



and beaver pitched their tents. Kiron was determined to get his tent pitched ready for his dad arriving later in the day.

Parents, cubs, beaver, scouts and explorers were divided into mixed teams and sent on a treasure hunt. Finding a sycamore leaf among the trees on the Barr Wood is not easy. There is only one sycamore tree. All the teams returned with their items in time for lunch.





The afternoon activity was creating an obstacle course in the wooded area beside the pioneering store. A variety of balance beams, rope bridges and other features were designed, constructed, tested and redesigned. The participants then raced each other round the course.

Back at site the three patrol leaders organised their patrols and guests to light the fires and cook the evening meal, chicken curry or chilli or both. While the groups were washing up, Robert and Andrew went out with glow sticks to prepare a wide game for all the participants. We then joined the Forth Valley scouts at camp fire.

Kiron helped Calum get the explorers fire lit on Sunday morning and then helped by cooking some of the bacon. We joined the Forth Valley scouts for flag break where Finlay, as the only beaver on site, had the honour of breaking the flag. This was followed by a short scouts own.

Returning to our own site, the parents joined the leaders inspecting the scouts and explorers. Inspection was followed by a series of activity bases that the groups rotated round. Calum McPherson and Erin organised a blind trail, Graham first aid, Andrew small tent pitching and Christine firelighting using Kelly kettles.

After lunch the scouts and explorers returned their patrol boxes of kitchen equipment before striking their tents. The cubs, beaver and parents carried equipment down to the trailer. Unfortunately there was a short shower of rain before the tents were down, just enough to make all the canvas damp.

Before the flag was taken down Lee and Suilven were invested as cubs, Mitchell and Fergus as scouts and Lewis, Heres and Grant as explorers.





MURDER AT THE VILLAGE HALL



On Friday 30th October, Glenfarg Arts Project played host to celebrated local crime writer Gillian Galbraith. Gillian is a former advocate specializing in medical negligence cases and the author of the Alice Rice series of detective novels set in Edinburgh.

Gillian was in Glenfarg to talk about her newest hero, Father Vincent Ross. *The Good Priest* is set in and around Kinross and mentions lots of familiar landmarks.

Both Glenfarg book groups chose *The Good Priest* for their October read and there were lots of questions from the roomful of book lovers.

Gillian explained that she likes to explore why good people do bad things, what makes normal people commit murder. Gillian feels little need for unnecessary violence and gore to tell a story, and told us how she preferred to write character-based books. She also said that she was surprised to find that she could just call up the police and ask them questions about procedure and they were always helpful.

When asked about how her career at the bar had influenced her writing, Gillian told an amusing anecdote from early in her writing career. One of the first characters she wrote was based on a very disagreeable judge that she knew, the lady in question had very distinctive flaws, and was immediately recognized by her publisher as his Godmother! A lesson learned.

Will the next Vincent Ross book feature Glenfarg? Very possibly.







What Makes A Film Fantastic?

Well of course, it's a matter of opinion. So that is why Glenfarg Community Cinema asks the audience. At the end of every film night, as the audience is leaving, they put a pebble into one of five jars to give us their opinion of the film.

The jars have been labeled Awful, Not Good, OK, Good and Fantastic. The votes are counted and published on the website and here in the newsletter. It's our own 'Rotten Tomatoes'. Thankfully, we hardly ever get a rotten one!

In fact we get a lot of Fantastic. What We Did On Our Holiday scored 95%. There have been several films in the 80s, and it seems that for over half of our films at least half of the audience rated them Fantastic.



Our October film was Inside Man, which I thought was very good. But was it Fantastic? The film centres on an elaborate bank heist on Wall Street over a 24-hour period. Directed by Spike Lee, I was expecting it to be stylish – and it was. There were wonderful overhead shots of the exterior of the Wall Street bank with fast camera action capturing the buzz of the police response, and interior shots of the gang's leader framed within the large circular vault door like Leonardo's Vitruvian Man.

A great cast – Clive Owen, Denzel Washington, Jodie Foster and Christopher Plummer – but maybe the gang's masks, which were an essential part of the plot, actually made it difficult for us to empathise with them.

The plot had twists and turns – perhaps too many, with the audience trying to work out what was going on! It started with us being sure that we knew who the baddies were, then perhaps they weren't so bad, but at the end comes the confession 'Of course I did it for the money'. I felt that this did at least raise it above the 'black and white' view of most films of this genre. But not everyone was satisfied with its ambiguous ending.

So I was happy that the cinema committee had decided to alter the voting categories, doing away with Not Good (a hardly used category) and adding a Very Good category. Here is how our audience voted.


March 11th THE GOLDEN DREAM







Vehicle Activation Signs – the previous Treasurer had reported that these are due to be installed in Main Street early December.

Boundary Changes – the CC has sent a letter to the Boundary Commission, strongly disagreeing with the proposals to move Glenfarg from Kinross-shire Ward into Almond / Earn Ward.

Fete Accounts – following a request from a member of the public for more information to be made available, the Fete Committee had published its income and details of the distribution of profits in the October newsletter. The CC had been informed by the Fete Committee that the Fete Accounts have been independently examined and will be presented at their AGM.

CCLr MacKenzie made the point that, in future, if anyone had a question in relation to the organisation of the fete or its financial position, such enquiries should be addressed to the fete committee, not the Community Council

Damage to wall on Main Street – CCLr Watson has reported this to BEAR.

Wallace Park / Duncreevie Road wall – CCLr Watson reported that this had been brought to the notice of Community Greenspace some time ago, who had discussions with the Roads Dept. Having visited the site, Roads Dept state it is not an issue for them. Community Greenspace are to remove a tree, which appears to be pushing out two particularly large stones from the wall. They suggest that the Community Payback Team may be able to help repair the wall.

Tennis Club – a member of the public had expressed concerns about vehicles driving through the park to the Tennis Pavilion unnecessarily. The Tennis Club therefore added to its October newsletter article the reiteration that this should only happen in exceptional circumstances.


Glenfarg & Duncreevie In Bloom – CCLr Mackenzie reported that traffic controls will be necessary for a short period on Main Street when overhanging trees are cut.

PLANNING:

Alex Johnson reported that, since our last meeting, 1 new application had been noted and Perth & Kinross Council had approved 3 applications.

At Hilton of Duncreevie, a cowshed erected without planning permission was to be taken down. The owner has put in an appeal and a decision is due in January.

The Forestry Commission has contacted the CC with revisions to their original plans for Springhall Forest. The new scenario takes account of a possible wind turbine on the site, although GREA report they are no longer pursuing this option. Changes to the planting scheme remove sycamore from boundary

CCllr Ponton handed out letters to the CCllrs from Foundation Scotland, relating to the governance arrangements for the RWE Innology Lochelbank Community Fund. The Memorandum of Understanding and Terms of Reference were also provided. These are to be discussed at the next CC meeting.

Interviews were held to appoint two new Panel Members from Glenfarg. Foundation Scotland has circulated the names of the successful candidates.

BINN WIND FARM COMMUNITY BENEFIT AGREEMENT:

CCllr Duncan reported that the agreement had now been signed by all four community councils involved – Abernethy, Earn, Glenfarg, Strathmiglo.

There are 31 conditions imposed on the approval for the wind farm. The police will manage Road closures for the transport of equipment during the build. Trial runs of these are planned.

Detailed plans of underground lines associated with the grid connection will be published. We will be informed of the tariff by January.

A Suppliers Day (10th November) has been advertised around the village and local businesses encouraged to attend.

VISION:

CCllr Mackenzie reported that returns from The Vision Questionnaire had been analysed. The group would meet with the Community Capacity Building Worker to organise a village event to report on the findings and come to agreement on the future priorities for our community.

AOCB:

The Glenfarg - a member of the public queried the present closure of the hotel, apparently until early December. The Community Council has not received any information from the hotel owner, and it was felt that there was a need to establish the facts. The Folk Club has arranged a meeting with the owner and will feed back any information. Cllr Barnacle emphasised that early intervention in these situations was vital. A decision was made to write to the owner, asking for information that would help the community understand what the plans for the hotel were. The point was made that whilst the hotel is a commercial business, it is a core part of the community and it was hoped that everyone would understand the community's desire to know that the future of its hotel was secure.

Police Report – no serious issues to report. Winter road safety being emphasised.

Treasurer Report – GCC admin account balance £279.65

GCC newsletter account balance £11,150.09

Treasurer has arranged erection of Christmas lights for the last week of November.

Road Safety Issues – CCllr Burlison raised the issue of escorted Scottish Water tankers. It was felt that recently the escort vehicle had not been providing motorists with enough warning of the oncoming tanker. It was decided to write to Scottish Water to express our concern.

CCllr Mackenzie

Grit Spreader – a member of the public reported that he had cleaned the spreader but it did not work properly when filled with the grit supplied to the pavement bins by P&KC. It was decided to purchase around 10 bags of pure salt and request that they be stored in GDIB's new shed on Hayfield Road.

CCllr Burlison

Newsletter - the new community councillors were requested to provide their photo and a short bio for publication in the December newsletter.

CCllr Watson

Superfast Broadband Provision – a member of the public from Cuthill Towers, which is outwith the CC's area, informed us that the residents had been advised that superfast broadband would not be available there until 2018. He queried whether there were parts of our area in the same situation, and was advised to put the question on the Glenfarg Grapevine. CCllr Ponton reported that OpenReach workers laying cables to connect the south of the village believed that the new cabinet was to be sited in Ladeside. As we had been told that the cabinet would be in Hayfield Road it was decided to contact OpenReach to check on this.

CCllr Watson

Speed Limits – a member of the public informed us that there are now more school children in Duncruevie and they (and other residents) are walking along roads with no pavements. He therefore requested that we pursue the possibility of a 20mph speed limit in this area. Cllr Barnacle advised that there are 3 rural areas where the 20mph limit is to be trialled. It was decided to request that Duncruevie also be considered, and Cllr Robertson offered to provide a contact.

Wallace Park Wooden Animals – the Community Payback Team has removed these for repair. It was agreed that the CC would order necessary materials and meet the cost so far (£49.50).

A children's colouring competition to decide on colours has been held, and the entrants will be judged at the Vision village event.

War Memorial Project – Jen Lindsay has carried out a research project on the lives of the men whose names appear on the Glenfarg War Memorial. This extensive piece of work has been handed over to the CC and is available in hard copy form in Arngask Church's archive or on the village website history section.

Cllr MacKenzie asked that the Minute record the community's thanks to Ms Lindsay for this hugely important contribution to the historical record of the community and commended it to all members of that community and to students of social and military history.

Data Protection – Cllr Watson informed the CC that, for data protection reasons, email addresses provided to the Grapevine email service would not be used for any other purpose. The file containing the addresses resides on a password-protected area of the CC's server and the password is known only to the Grapevine editors, the server owner and herself.

Dog Fouling Problems – there was extensive discussion on the recent increase in this problem. Solutions suggested were to challenge the owner / report to the dog warden / use Smartphone etc. It was believed that the dog warden has already carried out educational visits. Suggestions of locations were made for the two remaining signs (Greenbank Road and Birch Lane)




